

Erickson of Seattle is Low Bidder on Monmouth Water Job

\$17,410 Offer Takes Project

Four Others Seek Job For Replacement of All Town Pipes

MONMOUTH, Jan. 24.—Five bids were submitted to the city council of Monmouth for the water pipe replacement work. E. R. Erickson, Lloyd building, Seattle, was low bidder at \$17,410.30. His contract will be awarded when official approval arrives from PWA headquarters.

Other bidders were: Ek and Lind, Railroad Exchange building, Portland, \$18,715.26; J. C. Compton, McMinnville, \$20,692; Schmidt Construction Co., Portland, \$20,908.55; Parker-Schram Co., Portland and Oregon City, \$21,385.18. Ek and Lind installed Monmouth's sewer system 10 years ago, and the Parker-Schram company secured the contract for the gravity water system from Teal creek in 1919.

Plan New Hydrants
The contract calls for three additional hydrants, taking up and relaying of pipe and changing service connections. A better system of circulation will be perfected so that in case of fire in the central section re-enforcements of water will be obtained from the four precincts.

Most of the pipe will be of creosoted wood, except for some 6 and 10 inch cast iron pipe to go under the paving. Starting at the reservoir the pipe will be 10 inches in diameter and as laterals branch off the size will be reduced to 8, 6 or four inch pipe. There will be no dead ends in the new system.

According to specifications the contract must be awarded within 60 days, starting the count from last Thursday. The contractor is allowed 130 days from date of contract assignment.

Flax Monies To Be Raised

Mt. Angel Needs \$12,000 to Put Over Project; Select Site

MT. ANGEL, Jan. 24.—The success of the flax industry in this district will depend on whether or not the community can raise a sum of money between \$12,000 and \$15,000. The retting and scutching plant is an assured thing for Mt. Angel if the money necessary to match the government loan can be raised, the necessary acreage having been secured.

The group of men entrusted with the forming of a cooperative organization consists of Jos. Berni, chairman, Martin Rotavold, vice-chairman, Mike Weinacht, Fred Klein and Ben Miller. These men have decided on a site for the plant about a mile from Mt. Angel. Active steps toward raising the money will be begun next week.

Mt. Angel has established a reputation for being a cooperative town and it is thought that this characteristic of the community will come to the fore and put over this project.

Six-Month Cost For Linn Relief Reaches \$34,351

ALBANY, Jan. 24.—During the six month period ending December 31, 1935, Linn county spent \$34,351.37 for relief, according to the semi-annual report of the county clerk. Old age pensions amounted to \$10,013.04 and was distributed approximately among 220 pensions, the rate per month averaging around \$8 for each person. The number of pensioners varied per month, the report stated due to death or removal from the county, or as new pensions were allowed.

The widows' pensions amounted to \$6,985.00; indigent soldiers \$382.21; care of the poor \$16,970.12 and the old age pensions to \$10,013.04.

World's Greatest Dam Rises at Grand Coulee



As work progresses on Grand Coulee dam in north central Washington, the largest structure of its kind in the world takes shape, a mass of concrete which will rise to a height of 550 feet above a 500-foot thick base 4,300 feet long over which a

cataract of water twice the volume of Niagara Falls will flow to drive the generators to produce power. The lake which will be created by the dam will be 150 miles long and 400 feet deep when the power project is completed.
