Verdict on Riots Upheld by Court

Three in Lafayette Case Must Pay Penalty Is Ruling on Appeal

Convictions of Wayne Allen, John Nichols and Ruby Jones, on charges of rioting in Yamhill were affirmed by the state supreme court Tuesday in an opinion written by Justice Rand. These defendants, along with five other persons were arrested and indicted following a disturbance in a beer hall owned and operated by H. A. and Ida Stoler at Lafayette. During the controversy, which involved the beer hall owners, their employees and the persons arrested, the city marshal was attacked and beaten on the head.

The disturbance was not quelled until the marshal had shot one of the attackers and accidentally hit another person. Wayne Allen and John Nichols were sentenced to terms in the Yamhill county jail while Ruby Jones was committed to the state industrial school for girls to serve a term of three years. Among those acquitted were Carl Allen, Roy Jones, E. M. Maxwell, Archie Nichols and Orval Jones.

Claim No Rioting
The three defendants involved in the appeal contended that the acts proved in the lower court were not sufficient to constitute a riot and that if the proof was against them, it did not show that they had participated in its commission.

The supreme court held that there was no evidence to show that the defendants acted in self defense or that the marshal exceeded his authority.

In two other opinions, both written by Justice Bell, the supreme court held valid the organization of union high school district No. 5, Linn county, and union high school district No. 1, Yamhill county. In the former case the supreme court upheld Circuit Judge McMahon of Marion and Linn counties while in the latter case the court affirmed Circuit Judge Walker of Yamhill and Polk counties.

The court reversed Judge James P. Stapleton of Multnomah county in a damage suit filed by Sadie L. Peters against C. C. Hockley and C. C. Hockley, Jr.

Liquor Fee Total Already Over '35

Licenses fee receipts of the state liquor control commission for 1935 now aggregate a trifling more than \$199,000 as compared to \$168,000 during the entire year of 1934, according to figures released yesterday by the office of the commission Tuesday.

These licenses cover retail beer, package wines and beer, wholesalers, breweries and a few other less important sources.

The marked increase in license receipts this year was said to be due to the action of the 1935 legislature in boosting the annual fee for retail beer establishments from \$15 to \$25. Although the increased license fee became effective on March 1 last year, most of the retail beer dealers had received their 1935 licenses prior to that time.

The figures show that the license fees already collected this year have increased over those for the entire year 1935 despite the fact that there has been a marked reduction in the number of licenses issued.

Six Months Sentence Handed to Patterson But Parole Is Given

Six months in the county jail was assessed against H. D. Patterson yesterday by Judge L. H. McMahon when the prisoner admitted he presented a check for \$10 without sufficient funds in the bank to pay it.

The judge paroled him to Dwight Lear when it was learned Patterson had paid the check. He was not released from county jail, however, having some time yet to serve on a sentence incurred when he failed to report following a traffic law violation.

Case Dropped—Suit of Alfred Dunn against Damon Fleener and Lilyan W. Fleener was ordered dismissed in circuit court yesterday. The litigation has been settled out of court.

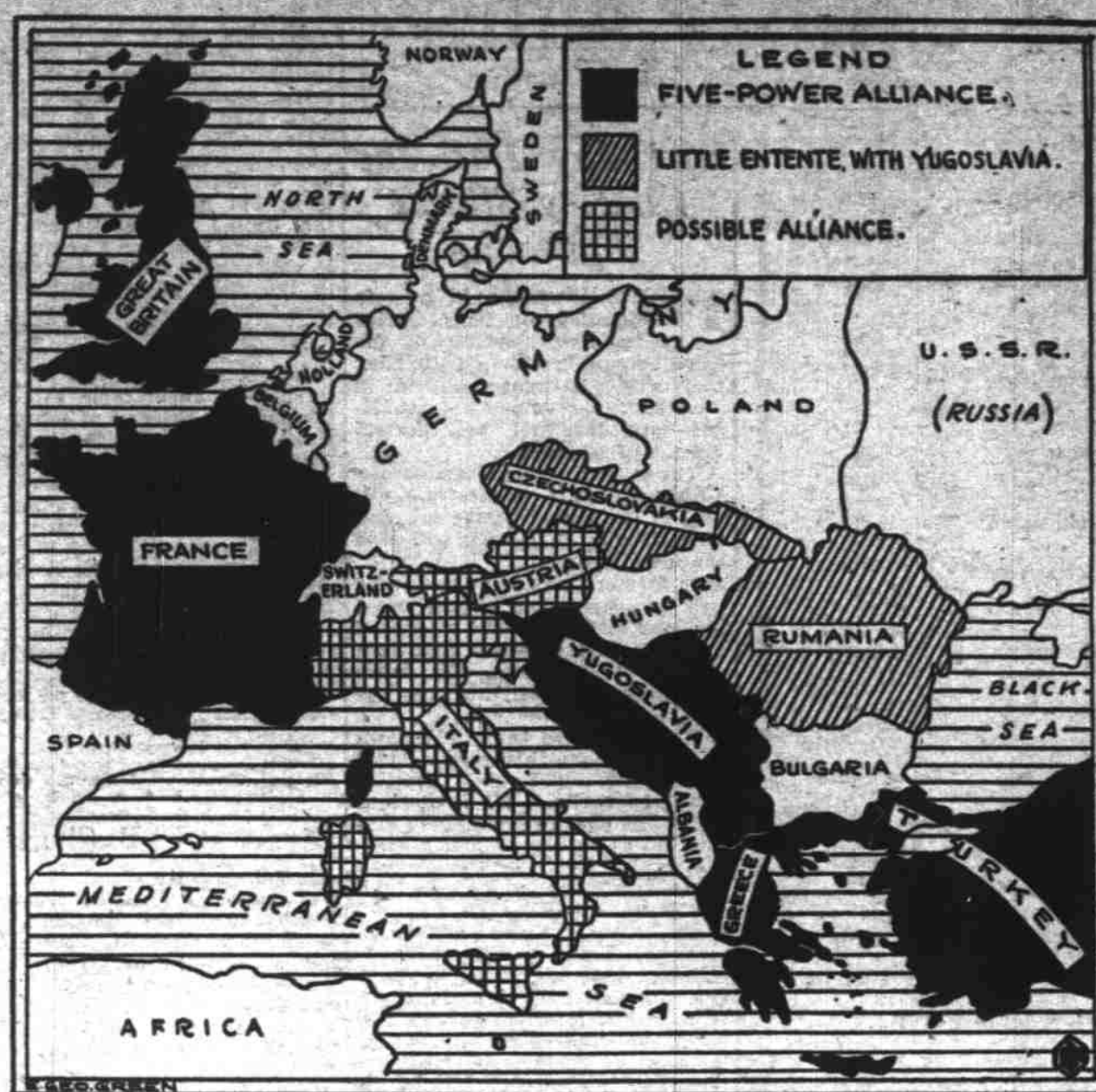

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Five Powers Join in Alliance Against Italy



Another move in the international drama which threatens to reach a climax in another European war was staged when an alliance of Great Britain, France, Turkey, Greece and Yugoslavia was formed to resist any attack by Italy on one of the members of the pact. Rumania and Czechoslovakia, who

form the Little Entente together with Yugoslavia, were considered virtual members of the pact because of their mutual assistance agreement with Yugoslavia. Although Italy stands officially alone against this alliance, Austria might side with Mussolini in case of a showdown.

Land Constitutes Principal Item on County Assessment Roll; City Lots Improvements Are Second in Value

Largest single item in the \$42,606,953 of assessed property in Marion county is an assessment of \$17,163,905 made against land in the county, a summary made yesterday by R. Shelton, county assessor, shows. The total acres of taxable land in the county are 514,589.

Improvements on town and city lots total \$7,621,820. Next item in the total of assessments made in the county is one of \$6,285,283. This represents the charge against all utilities in Marion county.

Town and city lots are assessed for \$4,905,580. Improvements on lands outside the cities are listed at \$3,344,715.

Other items assessed constitute

a minor part of the tax roll. Engines and machinery in plants in the county have an appraised value for taxation purposes of \$1,025,955. Merchandise and stock in trade totals \$1,231,980.

Livestock Big Item
Livestock has nearly \$450,000 in the total assessment of the county. Most valuable item is that of cattle which are listed at an average of \$19.10 a head; 12,976 cattle are assessed for an aggregate valuation of \$247,865. Horses and mules are assessed at an average of \$41.70 a head or \$120,330 for the 2886 on the roll in this county. Sheep and goats are assessed at \$1.72 each; they are valued at \$9,315; swine are appraised at \$5.89 each for a total valuation of \$11,945.
