Sales Tax For Pensions Leading Measure on Oregon Ballot

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It carried, the bill will permit the board of higher education to collect uniform student body fees, up to \$5 a term, from all students of higher educational institutions. If the measure fails, student fees will be voluntarily met; not paid as a condition precedent to enrollment at a state institution of higher education.

Federal Reserve Board Confirmed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (P)—Without a word of opposition, the senate today gave quick approval to President Roosevelt's reorganized federal reserve board.

Six of the seven members who on February 1 will take over the increased banking and credit control powers granted under the 1935 banking act, were confirmed without objection. A seventh board member has yet to be appointed.

Senator Glass (D-Va.) previously had cancelled his plan to fight confirmation of Governor Mariner S. Eccles of Utah, who will be the new board's chairman.

Besides Eccles, who was reappointed for four years, the only other member of the present six-man board to be retained was M. S. Szymczak, of Chicago. He was reappointed for 12 years.

The new members confirmed were: Joseph A. Broderick, of New York, 14 years; Ronald Ransom, of Georgia, six years; John McKee, of Ohio, 10 years, and Ralph W. Morrison, of Texas, two years.

Hoffman Reopens Lindbergh Matter

TRENTON, N. J., Jan. 30. (P)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman ordered the New Jersey state police today to reopen their investigation of the kidnapping and slaying of the Lindbergh baby.

The chief executive, who defied threats of impeachment two weeks ago after granting Bruno Richard Hauptmann, convicted murderer of the child, a 30-day reprieve which saved him from execution the night of January 17, told Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, superintendent of the state police, by letter that Hauptmann's fate is "almost the least important feature of this case."

He pointed to Col. Charles A. Lindbergh's own statement, made before a Bronx county grand jury and to Inspector Harry W. Walsh of Jersey City, that he had seen another man, besides the "John" who collected the \$50,000 ransom, at St. Raymond's cemetery, the Bronx, on the night of April 2, 1932, when the money was paid.
He dealt at length also with Dr. John C. Condon's statements and to his recent magazine articles in which the elderly educator said he heard the voice of a second man at the other end of the telephone the night of March 11, 1932, when he first made telephonic communication with the kidnaper.

Landon Lauded by Eastern Leaders

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (P)—Governor Landon of Kansas was generally believed in the capital tonight to be embarking on a middle-of-the-road course in quest of the republican presidential nomination.
Praise of his position on national affairs by eastern organization leaders in the party afforded a significant aftermath to his Topeka speech.

In contrast to their hostility toward Senator Borah of Idaho, one after another spoke highly of the powerful New York delegation to the Cleveland convention in the face of similar intentions on Borah's behalf.

There was no final telling whether these would hold. But the fact that Landon gave no hint of agreement with Borah's uncompromising stand against the old guard leadership gave rise to an impression at the capital that he would not surrender to Borah if a showdown was inescapable.

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turned to place their problems before their own organizations with the understanding, Gilmer said, that there would be "further negotiations" this morning.

Outside union representatives at yesterday's conferences included William Swain of Portland, western representative of the meat cutters-international; "Scotty" Cruikshank, secretary of the Portland local, and Max Sleeman, prominent Portland labor man.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30. (P)—The United Mine workers authorized their executive board today to withdraw the union from the American Federation of Labor whenever "circumstances warrant," opening the way for a wide open split in the ranks of labor.
