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by putting all money aside these to be raised by the new tax, into the indigent funds of the state.

The tactics of the legislature were obviously resented by voters. The proposed sales tax for old-age pensions was more completely defeated than any of its predecessors. The September primary, passed in the rainy 1935 season, also went down to defeat under the avalanche of "no" sentiment.

Not surprised at the results of the election was Governor Charles H. Martin, who nevertheless declared last night that he would not call a special session of the legislature to find new money for old-age pensions.

"The matter was submitted to the people; if they do not want a sales tax, there will be no old-age pensions unless we foreclose our more farms," said the governor.

"The state is now \$48,000,000 delinquent in its taxes and since no revenue is provided by other sources than property taxation, there will be no pensions."

Marion county officials said late yesterday they would continue to pay a county-financed pension. Since federal funds cannot be matched, county officials have claim the \$60,000 levied for 1935 old-age pensions in this area is undistributed. The money is distributed to nearly 500 pensioners, 70 years or over, at an average payment rate of \$10 to \$11 a month each.

Had the sales tax passed, and the state been able to meet federal appropriations, the county's levy of \$60,000, as well as the state's \$1,000,000 for old-age pensions, would have gone into the relief funds of the state.

"The people of the state in large measure resented the governor's action in supporting the sales tax," commented L. W. Townsend, president of the Anti-Sales Tax league of Oregon, in a statement last night. "The voters have spoken this time in no uncertain terms on the tax. The Townsend clubs, representing thousands of voters, went solidly against the tax because they thought the sales levy would lessen their chance of receiving the Townsend, federal old-age pension."

clerk also showed a favorable vote on the city manager plan.

The September primary proposal drew a slightly stronger vote than the student fee bill or the sales tax. Aggregate votes for the primary change were 40 per cent of the votes in opposition to the proposed change in the law.

Callers of Election Election clerks said many voters registered criticism directed at the legislature for the holding of the special election, contending it was unnecessary and involved the state in a waste of from \$80,000 to \$125,000. Most of this cost will be borne by the counties; the state itself will spend only \$15,000 in paying its share of the costs. Marion county's cost of the election is \$4000.

Proponents of the city manager form of government were not downcast last night. They said they thought the proposal ran into a negative psychology occasioned by voters' protests against the special election. With further public education and when the "no" vote was not the prevailing trend the plan could be adopted here, sponsors of the manager proposal said.

Salem is not facing an upset but will continue on in its present progressive manner regard regardless of the two to one defeat of the proposed city manager plan. Mayor V. E. Kuhn said last night, "If that is the wish of the majority of the people it is satisfactory with me." Mayor Kuhn said, "I'll continue to do the best I possibly can, even though the city manager plan was part of my program."
