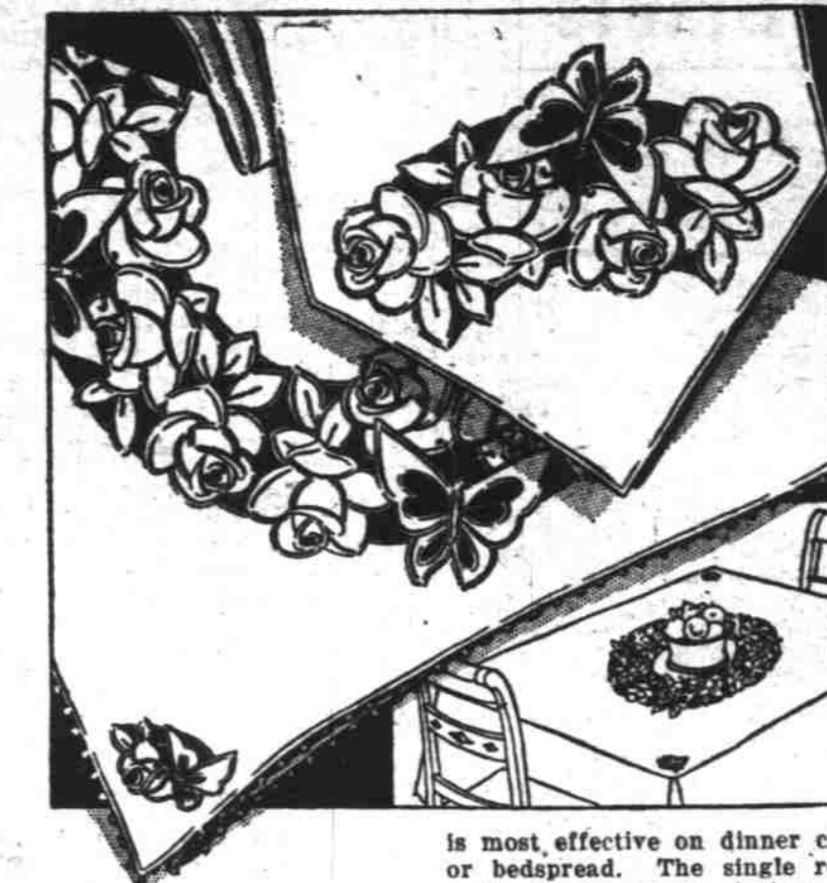
The bride-elect was affiliated with Alpha Phi at the University of Oregon. Mr. Sanford also attended Oregon and was a member of Beta Theta Pi.
