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more intensely than recent rigidity. The temperature skidded 22 degrees in 13 hours in Portland, starting with 38 degrees at 7 a. m., and hitting 16 at 6 p. m. By 9:30, it had risen to 17 despite the weather bureau's prediction of 10-degree temperature before morning.

In central Oregon, Bend reported the mercury falling rapidly from the 27-degree mark of the early morning. Zero weather was expected tonight. Skies remained clear.

Highways Perilous in Southern Oregon
A bitter wind raged through Klamath Falls, bringing snow to higher levels. Ice made surrounding highways hazardous. Medford and Grants Pass received a slightly more moderate wintry baptism, as the Willamette valley fared even better, mercifully speaking.

Snow covered many portions of the Columbia River highway, resulting in partially blocking the Old Oregon Trail in the Pendleton-La Grande area and brought with it minimums of 4 below in Pendleton and 2 above in La Grande. Meacham, atop the Blue Mountains, reported 10 below. The chill wind and snow halted all outdoor projects in the Bend area and sent the temperature around the 16-degree mark. Work on Bonneville dam was hampered. "Cloudy weather, snow or rain" was the forecast for tomorrow.

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etic conditions," he said. "Present-day social workers are often extremely subjective, thinking in terms of virtues being permanently so. Sometimes what we call virtues are the greatest vices. For instance, Leopold and Loeb were possessed with intelligence, but to what good use was it put? Social workers, by virtue of their experience, become sooner or later givers of oracles, judges of good and bad, desirable and undesirable, he explained. "As social workers you are engaged in the practice of art or making people adjust themselves to their environment. Conditions make men and men are liable to heed the warning that the new conditions cannot be met by the old methods," he explained.

Leprosy Martyr Body Going Home

HONOLULU, Feb. 7.—(AP)—In a koa wood coffin, a last touch of Hawaii where he resided for most of his lifetime, the body of Father Damien, Belgian leprosy martyr, will reach San Francisco on the United States army transport Republic February 9, enroute to his homeland.

The body will lie in state in a San Francisco cathedral before the Republic continues to Panama, where the body will be placed aboard the Belgian training ship Mercator, bound for Belgium.

At the request of Leopold, king of the Belgians, officials exhumed Father Damien's body from his lonely grave on Molokai, while the people of that peaceful island wept in memory of the unassuming priest who lived and worked in voluntary exile among the lepers of Kalaupapa. He died of his disease February 15, 1889.

The body is being taken to Belgium despite the protests of Hawaiians, for belated recognition of Father Damien's work.

He said that there was a growing feeling that people outside the city should pay additional for the services of the fire department, pointing out that calls to points beyond the city limits are expensive, that the same service is expected as is given in town, although it is impossible to take a full crew, some members always being left to protect the city. Fire hazards are decreasing because of semi-annual inspections, he said.

"The budget committee had absolutely no authority to eliminate this item from the budget and they will have to include sufficient funds next year to take care of the 1937 rental and the accrued rentals and interest for this year," he said.

Representatives of the Salem Trades and Labor assembly occupied the main portion of time of the commission in urging the payment of prevailing wages for prevailing hours work in all city projects. The commissioners pointed out the commission always had attempted to pay the prevailing scale but was unable to decide on what basis would be taken as prevailing hours due to the conflict in union and PWA scales.

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accordingly, fixing the penalty to death as prescribed by Idaho law. "If you decide the alleged murder was not committed after premeditation or malice aforethought, then you may return a verdict of second degree murder."

He instructed the jury as to the other three decisions—voluntary manslaughter, involuntary manslaughter and acquittal. "It is not necessary, gentlemen," he continued, "to have the defendant prove positively he is insane in order to be acquitted; if there is only a reasonable doubt as to the defendant's sanity, you may return a verdict of acquittal."
