Silverton Growers Sell Hops For 9 and 6 1/4 Cents

SILVERTON HILLS, Feb. 7.—Charles Wells and his detail of 28 men from Camp 611, CCC, have finished the project of pulling and burning stumps from the picnic grounds in the area around the South Falls. The work has continued for the past two months. A few men will remain at the park to clean up the odds and ends that are left.

Cedar was obtained some time ago and built into attractive tables and benches for the grounds. The caretaker's new cabin is under construction and will be completed about April 1. It will be a modern and attractive cabin built in the woods several rods farther from the South Falls than their present cabin.

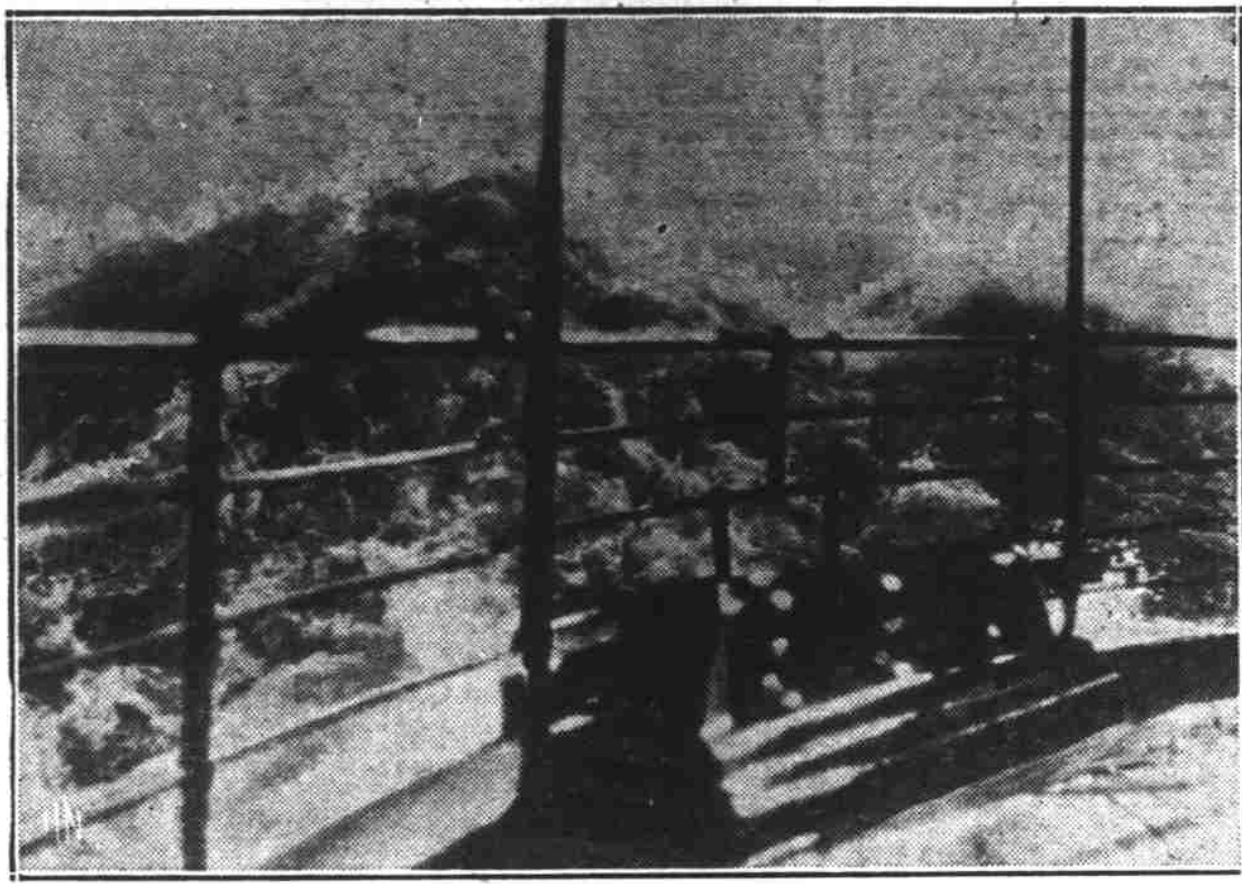
Elinore Fowler Enters Doernbecher Hospital to Have Operation on Ankle

John Schifferer Called to Beyond

Funeral Services Will Be Held at 1:30 O'Clock Here Today

CLOVERDALE, Feb. 7.—John Schifferer, sr., who died February 5, was born in Tagshausen, province of Wittenburg, Germany, March 22, 1859. He was educated in the schools of Germany and on September 9, 1879, he was married to Gottlieb Baurer. In 1884 he came with his wife and two children to America and settled near Elgin, Ill., where he lived for 10 years. While there four more children were born to them.

In 1893 the family moved to Turner where they have since resided. After coming to Oregon one daughter, Emma, was born to them. Two sons died in infancy. The eldest daughter, Louise, died in February of 1905.

Mr. Schifferer united with the German Baptist church upon coming to Oregon and remained faithful to his death. September 9, 1929, he and his wife celebrated their golden wedding anniversary surrounded by their children and grandchildren. Shortly after this event, Mrs. Schifferer died November 8, 1929. Since that time Mr. Schifferer has been living with his daughters, Frieda and Emma, and his son William, on the old home place.

He is survived by three daughters: Frieda of Turner, Marie of Portland and Emma who now lives in Salem; and three sons, Fred, John W. and William, all of Turner. He is also survived by a brother and sister in Germany and a brother in Illinois. Several grandchildren and one great grandchild survive him.

John Schifferer was a good farmer, a good friend and a good neighbor. Many young people of his community have appreciated his wise counsel.

The funeral services will be held Saturday, February 7, 1:30 p. m., at the German Baptist church in Salem with Clough-Barrick funeral directors in charge. Burial will be in the Odd Fellows cemetery near the old home, by the side of his wife.
