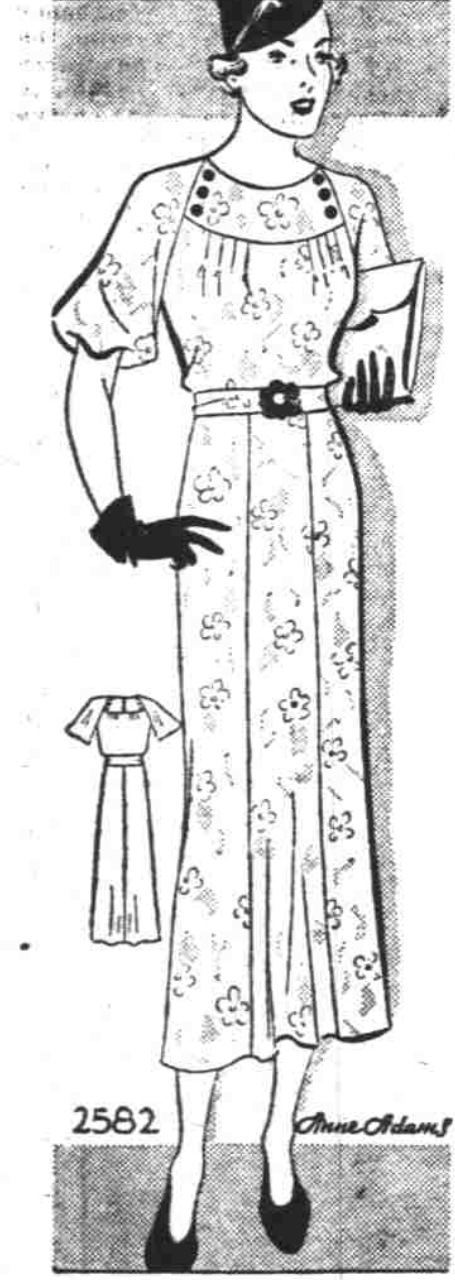
Happy Hour Dance Club Gives Shower
