## Hood River Comes Friday and Rooks Saturday; Team Looks Good

Two hard-to-beat high school quintets and the flashy Oregon State rooks will furnish court opposition for the Salem High Vikings in the three games their schedule books for this week.

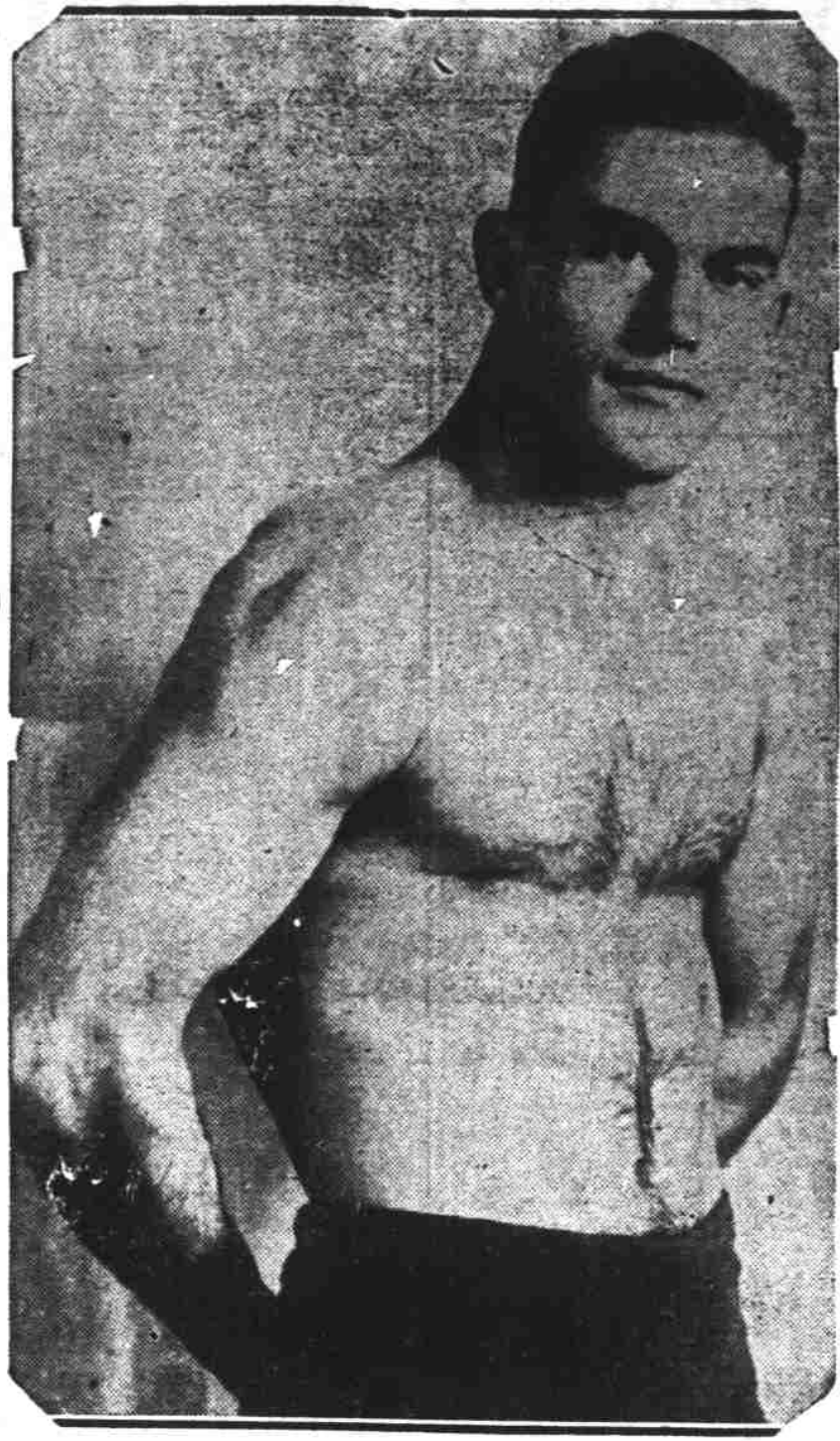
Huntington's stalwart youngsters will travel to Eugene Tuesday to meet their long time rivals, the Eugene Axemen, and will face the strong Hood River team Friday and the Rooks Saturday on the Vikings home court.

Steady improvement over the last pair of weeks has raised Viking hopes that the Salem team will be ready to go to town when the state basketball tournament falls due. Coach Huntington's team has thrown off an early season lethargy apparently and in its last games its offensive was jaegerly speeded up.

Will Need Speed  
The Vikings will need all the speed and endurance they can muster, however, in their games this week. Rivalry between Salem and Eugene teams has always been strong and the Axemen are this year second only to Corvallis in the District seven league.

The Vikings may attempt to even matters with the Oregon State Rooks who downed them 26 to 22 in an early season game at Corvallis. Bob Rissman, former Astoria high star, was the fly in Salem's eye in the first game, scoring 14 points. Ali and Fred Sandoz, strong men of last year's Corvallis high teams, are also Rook stars.

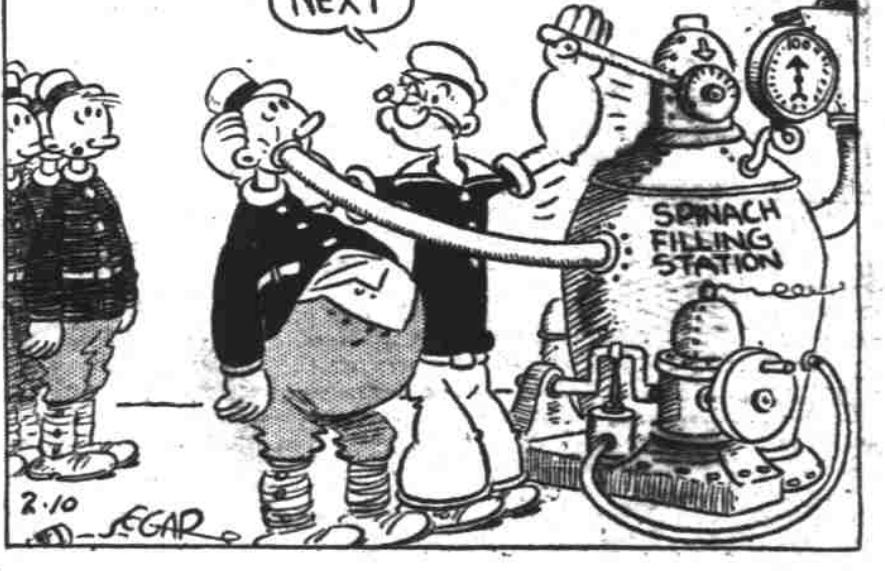
