Few Cases Reported, Need For Immunizing Exists Says Health Officer

The menace of diphtheria oung children in Marion county has not disappeared despite the fact that extremely few cases of the disease have been reported in recent years, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, said yesterday. He urged that parents continue to have pre-school children immunized to this disease. which often results in serious complications if not in death.




