

Onion Market Active, Prices Unchanged; Butter Churn Decreases

Egg Receipts Are Increasing

Potato Prices Are Firm; Demand For Quality Apple Showing Slow

PORTLAND, Feb. 12. (AP)—There was a further decrease in butter churning at Portland for recent days although reports suggested a slight increase of supplies from outstate points. No change in price.

Egg receipts were again increasing but the totals were still comparatively light while consumption has gained a trifle. A fair gain in potato movement was showing here and prices were firm. The chief influence is the weather which makes it difficult to load at the source.

Slow demand was showing for quality apples and pears. Demand is fairly good for the fruit selling 40c to 50c.

A somewhat better call for cranberries was indicated. Retailers were buying more liberally of re-run stock of quality up to \$2 box, he says.

Cauliflower Arriving
Some fancy quality cauliflower is now arriving from Roseburg but the heads are too large. Arrivals are chiefly 5s, 6s and 7s, which are priced around 90c.

Fine lug turnips are being offered out of Stockton at 85c-91c to retailers.

All root vegetable prices continued firm.

Demand for hothouse cucumbers was slow, mostly \$1.25 dozen.

Rhubarb continued slow around 90c for fancy and 70c for choice 15c.

California peas were unusually low priced with quality stuff down to 8c lb.

Stem tangerines from California were finding favor around \$1.50 half box.

Asparagus continued slow around 25c-27c, which means a loss to importers.

Onion Market Active
Onion market was fairly active but unchanged in price.

California spinach, chiefly out of Stockton, was being offered \$1.75 per box.

Limited Quantities Of Wool Are Sold

BOSTON, Feb. 12. (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Limited quantities of territory wools were sold on the Boston market today.

Original bag lines of bulk 55c, 60c, 70c blood comprising French combing and strictly combed staple moved at 86-88 cents scoured basis. Small lots of 64s and finer territory wools in original bags brought 86-88 cents scoured basis for short French combing.

90-91 cents for average to good French combing, and 92-93 cents for wools running bulk good French combing and strictly combed staple.

Fall Texas wools sold at around 74-76 cents scoured basis.

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Logan Control Plans Listed

Each Grower to Have One Vote; Grower Keeps Fruit Till Sold

Among details which are tentatively proposed for inclusion in the loganberry control plan, to be set up under the cooperative association laws of Oregon, the joint meeting this week of the logan growers, committee and co-op processors suggested the following features, to be included in a suggested articles of association now being drawn up by W. L. Linfoot, local attorney:

The logan co-op will attempt to have the co-op plants return a price not less than the price the independent buyer is required to pay, and indications so far are that co-op processors are willing to work with this plan on any feasible basis. Close cooperation throughout between growers and co-op processors is anticipated.

Vote Per Grower
As tentatively planned, each grower will have one vote in the control association, regardless of acreage or tonnage. The proposal is for the co-op association to do the actual selling. This will be handled through the grower signing a marketing contract with the co-op. In actuality, the grower will select the buyer and will instruct the co-op to sell his berries to this buyer, the grower and buyer signing before the control co-op signs.

Berries will remain in hands of the grower until sold, though an office for the control board will be set up, probably in Salem.

Penalties for attempt to get the grower to violate the marketing contract with the control co-op will be set up in the agreement.

Same Fee Planned
The tentative plan is for the control co-op to collect 75 cents per ton, the same as under the old control board, from the growers. This is to be paid by the buyer as the sale is made. Otherwise, money paid for the loganberries will be paid directly to the growers by the buyer and not to the co-op.

H. G. Rumbaugh of Albany was elected chairman of the committee at the meeting here. Every member of the committee of 13 attended the meeting. J. H. Kruse of Albany is the 13th member of the committee, 12 having been previously announced.

Leaders feel that in members of the berry growers' association and cooperatives they have enough signatures already to put the new control idea over, but that many growers not yet signed will come in.

Heavy Pruning Is Held Inadvisable

Riches Suggests Delay Till Frost Damage Extent Learned

County Agent Harry Riches yesterday stated that his office is recommending to orchardists a not too heavy pruning until late in the spring, when extent of injury due to heavy freezes this winter will be better determined.

Evidence so far points to heaviest injury to walnut and cherry trees in the lowlands, while even those trees on more protected and better drained land are deemed not seriously injured. Apples and pears, so far as is known now, were hurt very little, if any.

October Harm Heaviest
Riches says that more harm was done to the trees by the severe weather in October than by all of the freezes since that time. Inasmuch as sap was still up in the trees and leaves had not been shed.

Pruning in some orchards was being carried on as the freeze of late last week struck, however, Riches says this pruning was not heavy, and so the cold spell will likely not do any damage.

Longacre Property Sold To Employ Timber Mill

SILVERTON, Feb. 11. — The Homeowner's Agency of Silvertown reported the sale of the old Longacre property on Liberty hill to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Morgan. The Morgans have been living at Silvertown for the past year. Prior to that they made their home on the Ryberg farm on the Waldo Hills road.
