

Lions Hear About Orient Situation

Japan Will Never Give Up Manchoukuo, Declares Dr. Frank Smith

Japan is fostering the development of Manchoukuo, formerly Manchuria, for four purposes: first, to develop her commerce; second, to resist Russian advance; third, to provide an outlet for her excess population; and, fourth, to obtain natural resources. And the Japanese will never relinquish their hold on this new territory.

These were the declarations of Dr. Frank Smith, formerly in charge of Methodist missions in Korea, who yesterday addressed the Salem Lions club on "What is Happening in Manchoukuo." He predicted that Japan, intent on carrying out these aims, would not engage in a war with either United States or Europe.

The Japanese are sponsoring a development of Manchoukuo that is the reverse of the usual methods of pioneering, Dr. Smith stated. Instead of first expanding agriculture, they are building modern cities. Later they will encourage the development of agriculture and recovery of natural resources such as timber, coal, iron and gold.

Dr. Smith told the Lions that Japan had been made through careful and strict planning one of the most modern of nations. As an example he cited that its harbor, naturally an inferior one, had been made exceptional by construction of better terminal facilities than found in the average United States seaport.

A renewed request for action on the proposed \$10 a ton flax subsidy for Oregon flax growers has been made to Washington this week by the governor. It was learned yesterday at the state house.

The matter of the subsidy now rests with Comptroller McCord, the agricultural department having approved the subsidy plan. Governor Martin is very desirous that the subsidy be granted to assist the three new privately owned scutching and retting plants in securing an adequate acreage of flax this season.

Seniors Win Out, Song-Yell Event

Salem high school seniors today will elect one of three girls from their membership for entry in the drawing Tuesday for the selection of the Oregon girl whom the Daughters of the American Revolution will send to their annual continental congress at Washington, D. C., in April. Candidates to be voted on today, selected by the faculty, are Dorothy Williams, Alice Swift and Ruth Kellogg.

The state winner will be selected by lot at 11 o'clock Tuesday morning in the office of C. A. Howard, state superintendent of public instruction, according to Mrs. Mark V. Weatherford of Albany, state D. A. R. regent. First and second alternate names also will be drawn.

The D. A. R. will escort one girl from each of the 48 states to the national capital and entertain them there from April 17 to 21, expenses paid. Termed the Ruth Bryan Owen plan pilgrimage, the project is one to promote citizenship among youth, according to the sponsors.

Peter Andresen Funeral Is Held

HAYESVILLE, Feb. 13.—Peter Nicholas Andresen, whose funeral was held today, was a well known resident of this community, having lived here for the past 17 years.

He was born in Flemsburg, Germany, August 29, 1868, the oldest of a family of two girls and two boys.

When he was one year old, his parents came to this country and resided at Brooklyn, N. Y.

At 12 years of age he moved to York, Neb. where he resided until 1905 when he moved to Holdrege, Neb. In 1912 he made his first visit to Oregon, returning two years later to make his permanent residence here.

He was married to Georgiana Rosette Lucas at Benedict, Neb., December 28, 1897.

He was engineer at the First National bank building in Salem at the time he was taken ill four years ago.

He leaves a widow, Georgiana Rosetta, two sons, Charles E. and Clarence F. both of this community, three grandchildren, father, Chris Andresen and a brother, H. W. Andresen, both of Funk, Neb. and a sister, Mrs. Rose Lucas of Salem.

He was a member of the A. O. U. W. of Nebraska.
