Peterson Funeral Scheduled Sunday

INDEPENDENCE, Feb. 20.—Groves Albert Peterson, 65, veteran Oregon school teacher and farmer, died at the family home here today. Funeral services, in charge of the Keeney Funeral home, will be held from the Presbyterian church at 1 p. m. Sunday with Rev. Henry G. Hansen officiating. Interment will be in Bellefontaine cemetery.

Mr. Peterson was born at Sierra Villa, Calif., June 3, 1870. He moved to Portland with his parents at the age of nine and later to Bellefontaine, Benton county. There he married Clara Starr January 15, 1889, and five children were born to the couple. Clara Starr Peterson died in 1906.

After marrying Mrs. Mary H. Withrow December 30, 1908, at Monmouth, Peterson moved to Suver where he lived for ten years, and then moved to the Oak Point district where he and Mrs. Peterson had since lived. To them two children were born.

Mr. Peterson taught school in Oregon for 20 years and then engaged in farming. He was a lifelong Presbyterian and an active member of the Monmouth grange.
