Stage Project Gets Approval

Chamber Members Discuss Eagles Convention, Other Events

SILVERTON, Feb. 20.—A stage line operating directly between Silvertown and Salem, the Eagles state convention to be held here in June, and the possibility of a Fourth of July celebration at Silvertown were among the matters discussed at the Wednesday night meeting of the chamber of commerce held at Toney's hat shop and presided over by Mrs. J. C. Schlador, president.

Mrs. Schlador brought up the matter of a stage operating between Silvertown and Salem, explaining that an independent group had approached her on the matter, stating its willingness to run the stage if the chamber would express favorable comment. The forum went on record as favoring it. No other requests were made by those desiring to run the stage.

R. J. Baldwin, secretary of the local Erie of Eagles, was present and spoke on the convention. Baldwin also displayed tire covers with the slogan "Call to Silvertown" which are to be used to advertise the convention. Over 2000 are expected to attend the convention according to Baldwin.

4th Jubilee Talked
It was also Baldwin's suggestion that Silvertown think about celebrating the Fourth. Mrs. Schlador pointed out that Silvertown has had no local celebration for several years and that such an observance might prove popular here again.

James Monroe, Boy Scout executive from Salem, was present and spoke on the procedure necessary for any organization to sponsor a Boy Scout group. There are five million Scouts in the world and 86 per cent of the troops are sponsored by churches, 12 per cent by civic organizations and 2 per cent by lodges, according to Mr. Monroe. He was introduced by Parzy Rose, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Boy Scout committee. Mr. Monroe also pointed out that should Silvertown sponsor more than one troop the assessment would not be higher on Silvertown than it is now.

Help Valley Group
E. J. Adams reported that the Greater Willamette Valley association was functioning, suggested that Silvertown get behind the movement, particularly when the solicitation for members would begin in the near future. Silvertown's quota, arrived at by figuring a 10 per cent capita assessment, is approximately \$250. The local committee at work on this is composed of Robert Goetz, Otto Leard, Elgin McCleary, Earl Adams and George Hubbs.
