

Late Session Brings Drop in Butter, Butterfat and Egg Prices

Declines Run Even One Cent

Only Butter Firsts Not Changed; Market For Poultry Firm

Butter, butterfat and eggs dropped in price at the late session of the Portland produce exchange yesterday, according to Associated Press quotations.

The exchange set a cent lower price on butter extras at 35 cents while standard and prime firsts were down a cent to 34 1/2 cents. Firsts were unchanged.

Butterfat was quoted down 1 1/2 cents at 38-39 cents.

Eggs were off a cent with large U. S. specials at 23 cents, U. S. extras and medium extras 21 cents.

Portland, Feb. 26. — (AP) — Market for poultry was firm today but prices in general were unchanged.

Onion prices steady. Onions showed a drifting tone with the bulk of the Oregon supply still held in store in a partly-frozen condition.

Suggesting some betterment in the demand for apples and especially the cheaper sorts, was the advance of 1/2 lb. in jumble of varieties of Romes and Wisconsin.

Country killed meat trade retained a substantial demand as well as firm price.

New potatoes were weaker and lower with Florida 5-6 lb. Hothouse cucumbers continued in slow sale.

Asparagus price has been cut as low as 12c lb. for fancy green.

Values Adjusted On Share Market

Prices Irregular With Trend Downward and Variety Limited

NEW YORK, Feb. 26. — (AP) — A continued adjustment of values threaded its way through the stock market today with prices for the most part irregularly lower by a minor margin.

The volume of trading at 2,033,955 shares was slightly under the previous day, and the number of issues traded also was restricted.

During the final hour, after the mold of the market had been formed, buying and selling slowed to a walk.

The steels were mostly lower, both U. S. Steel and Bethlehem being off fractions to over a point, but Midland Steel products was traded actively at a 4-point advance on the day.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks declined 4 of a point to 60.5, reflecting a slowing down after three days of great reductions.

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Crop Loss Fear Puts Wheat Up

Dust Storms in Kansas Are Cause For Two-Cent Rise Near Close

CHICAGO, Feb. 26. — (AP) — Crop damage fears that took stronger grip of the wheat market today hoisted prices nearly 2 cents a bushel, and carried May up to \$1.00.

Just before trading was ended, severe dust storms were reported in parts of Kansas, with visibility little better than zero. Indications of considerably colder weather tended further to suggest serious harm to crops, owing in particular to abruptness of the change from unseasonably high temperatures of late.

Wheat closed strong at the day's top level, 1 to 1 1/2 cents above yesterday's finish, May \$1.00 1/2, July 91 3/4, corn 7 1/2, up, May 60 1/2, oats 36 1/2, advanced, and provisions unchanged to 12 cents higher.

Corn Belt Wet
Corn and oats were responsive to wheat strength and to wet weather over the corn belt.

Provisions rallied owing to bullish behavior to the cottonseed oil market.
