seemed to infuriate the officer at the head of the assassin. He drew his sword and slashed at Takahashi, nearly severing the older statesman's right arm.

Takahashi died within a few hours.
The wife of Admiral Viscount Makoto Saito, lord keeper of the privy seal, was with her husband at their residence not far from the imperial palace when a party of about a score of the rebels, armed with machine guns, broke in. She tried to move between the assassins and her husband, and even placed her hand over the muzzle of one of the machine guns being used to kill him. Her hand was wounded.

(The fourth statesman assassinated was Gen. Jotaro Watanabe, director of military education, who was killed in his residence.)

First Bonus Bond Is Run Off Press

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(P)—First of the 38,000,000 baby bonds to pay the soldier bonus were run off government presses yesterday while officials looked on.

The bonds are green-faced, and bear the portrait of Andrew Jackson. They are dated June 15, 1936, and will bear 3 per cent interest until cashed. Approximately \$2,400,000,000 will be needed for their ultimate retirement.

Highway and Tracks Along Columbia Cleared

THE DALLES, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—The upper Columbia highway yielded to road crews today. Debris brought by slides was removed and the highway re-opened. Railroad tracks were also cleared. Falling rocks were declared a continued menace as road traffic on highways generally were open. Flood waters washed over several roads, however.

Pre-Depression Salaries Restored to Teachers

GRESHAM, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—The Gresham school board voted to restore pre-depression salaries to teachers here. Half of the 20-per-cent cut was returned in 1935 and the other half will be forthcoming next fall. All teachers were re-elected.

Three Indictments Returned in Lane Vice Probe

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—The Lane county grand jury, investigating alleged vice conditions here, returned four secret indictments today. One arrest followed immediately—that of Mrs. C. G. Brown on a warrant charging operation of a house of ill-repute. The investigation followed published reports that vice was rampant in this area.

New Trial for Cronin to Start April 1

ALBANY, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—District Attorney J. K. Weatherford, Jr., said today the trial of James J. Cronin on charges of murder will start April 1. A previous trial, in which Cronin was charged with having killed his hunting companion, Claude Hult, last November 1, resulted in the disagreement of the jury.

Invitations to Coos Bay Bridge Opening Go Out

NORTH BEND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—City officials and the North Bend chamber of commerce sent letters to cities throughout southwestern Oregon this week asking representatives to attend the dedication of the \$2,235,000 Coos Bay highway bridge, tentatively set for June 5, 6 and 7.

Portland Motor Fatalities Keep Pace with 1935

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—Frank Hornby, 46, died today as a result of injuries received in an automobile collision early Sunday. His death brought to 22 the number of fatalities from traffic accidents here since December 1, 1935—the same number as that of the corresponding period a year ago.

North Bend Bank Sold to Portland First National

NORTH BEND, Ore., Feb. 27.—(P)—C. F. Kibler, cashier of the North Bend National bank, announced today the institution had been sold to the First National bank of Portland, effective March 1. Kibler said he was being retained as manager. Deposits of the institution total about \$400,000.

Ohio Son Drafted To Oppose Borah

COLUMBUS, O., Feb. 27.—(P)—Ohio organization republicans pitted a "favorite son" presidential candidate today against Senator William H. Borah of Idaho for control of the state's 52 delegates to the national convention.

Robert P. Taft of Cincinnati, son of the late President Howard Taft, was chosen by the state central committee as the organization's presidential candidate, to whom its state of delegate candidates will pledge their first choice. Charles R. Frederickson of Coshocton was selected as second "favorite son" candidate to whom delegate candidates will pledge their second choice. He is a former state chairman and a former president of the Ohio Manufacturers' association.

The committee's action came after four other possible candidates informed State Chairman Ed D. Schorr they would not enter the state primary. They were Sen. L. D. Dickinson of Iowa, Colonel Frank Knox, Chicago publisher; Gov. Alf M. Landon of Kansas; and Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg of Michigan.

the night of Sloan's death. He said he was awakened about 2 o'clock the morning of January 2 by Kyle who said: "I wish you'd get up; I've shot a man."

Corroborating testimony of Mrs. Sloan was given Wednesday. Smith said Kyle declared he didn't know whom he had killed. After turning on the dead man's blue overalls, Kyle told Smith, the latter declared, that he had been asleep in bed when someone attacked him, declaring he wanted Kyle's money.

Kyle told Smith he drew a gun from under his pillow and fired three times at the man at the Kyle house, Smith was told by the defendant to examine the gun and see if three shots had been fired. Smith then said he examined the body on the bed, declaring to Kyle that "it looked like Jean."

After turning on the dead man's head, Smith identified the man as Sloan and Kyle concurred. Kyle then asked Smith to notify the coroner. Although he had stated that he thought Sloan had gone home, Kyle said "I suppose I'll be arrested."

Kyle followed Smith's instructions and stayed at the chicken ranch while police were called. Smith went to the Ed Miller house, aroused Miller, and together they went to the Henry Hunt place and from there officers were called.

No witnesses are allowed in court simultaneously, the bailiff bringing each witness in when called and taking the witness away before the next person is called. The jury is kept locked up at night. There was no likelihood of the case being concluded until sometime next week.

Wallace Tries to Enjoin Mae West

NEW YORK, Feb. 27.—(P)—Asserting that "right is right," Frank Wallace today renewed his efforts to obtain a court order declaring him to be the husband of Mae West, motion picture star.

From Supreme Court Justice John E. McGehean he obtained permission to serve Mae West through the sheriff of Los Angeles county, California, with papers in his suit for a declaratory judgment.

"She has money and power," he said, "but justice is on my side. That makes it even." He made it plain through the new lawyer, however, that he wished to avoid any "unpleasantness or embarrassment" because he said he still had the "warmest esteem and admiration" for the alleged actress.

The alleged Mrs. Wallace, who contends she "never heard of the guy," called her alleged husband's latest move a publicity stunt.

Expensive Quest For Plane Ended

SALT LAKE CITY, Feb. 27.—(P)—A \$25,000, five-month search for the wreckage of a missing Standard Oil Company of California plane ended today when a diving crew located the salt-encrusted bulk on the floor of Great Salt Lake at a point 22 miles north of the southern shore line.

It was not learned whether the body of G. A. Lenz, co-pilot, was in the ship. Diver George E. Johnson of San Francisco said he would make a more thorough investigation tomorrow before efforts are made to raise the sunken craft.

Farm Aid Scheme Given Final Okeh

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(P)—The house and senate quickly stamped final approval today on legislation for a new \$500,000,000 farm-aid program to replace AAA crop control subsidies invalidated 53 days ago by the supreme court.

President Roosevelt generally was expected to lose little time in affixing his signature to make the bill law. His agricultural advisers have emphasized the necessity for speed to affect this year's planting.

The senate, whose action was punctuated only by an assertion by Senator Borah (R-Ida) that the bill conferred "omnipotent powers" on the secretary of agriculture, recessed until Monday.

Vice-President Garner was given unanimous consent to sign the measure during the holiday to assume quick transmittal to the White House.

Standard of Knowledge On Traffic Laws Lower This Year, Salem High

Salem high school students are slightly less well informed as to traffic regulations this year than last year, a test based on the state motor laws proved this week. The test was given in connection with the second annual safe driving course conducted this week in the senior and junior high schools by the social science instructors.

The senior high average in the operators' examination this week was 23.98 out of a possible 30 as against 24.6 a year ago. The junior high average this week was 16.45 and that at Parrish junior high, 13.7.

Low-Cost Housing Subsidy Demanded

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(P)—The American Federation of Labor decided today to carry its fight of a \$500,000,000 low cost housing program directly to President Roosevelt.

Already called upon to arbitrate a dispute among high new dealers over details of a program that have been working on, Mr. Roosevelt will face a labor demand for both federal subsidies and low-interest loans to build homes for low-income workers.

The federation's demand for a \$500,000,000 appropriation this year to start off the program came in the fact of a White House assertion that the administration had approved no such figure. The federation proposed that the program be entrusted to a national public housing authority, divorced from existing housing agencies.

The administration's position centered around a difference over whether the government should provide subsidies or only low interest loans.

Japan Coup Cited In Hagood Matter

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—(P)—Major General Johnson Hagood formally relinquished command of the 8th corps area and the third army at San Antonio, Texas, today as congressional friends here failed in an effort to have his "punishment" set aside or modified.

These actions stood out as the storm continued to blow on Capitol hill over the disciplining of Hagood. On the senate side the word "terrorism" was used again, coupled with a republican assertion that the exiling of the general was discussed in advance at a White House cabinet meeting.

The house meanwhile heard a new democratic defense of the action. Representative Harter (D-Ohio) called the attention of the house to the mutiny in which Japanese officers and men assassinated the Premier and other statesmen in a coup d'etat. This, he said, in a house speech, was an example of why army officers should stay out of politics.

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Silent Gunmen Hold Up Store

Carter believes his assailants drove away in a small automobile. He could not identify the machine but he is certain he could identify the gunmen, he declared.

One he said was in the early 20s and the other in the late 20s. Carter said he had seen one of the men before, probably in his store a few days ago.

Good Descriptions Of Pair Are Given

Carter described the gunmen as follows:
No. 1 — Dark complexioned, weight 150 pounds, height five feet 8 1/2 inches, especially well-dressed, wearing dark suit and cap.

No. 2 — Sandy complexioned, weight 165 pounds, height slightly under six feet, wearing dark trousers, light coat and a hat.

"There might have been a third party in a car outside," Carter said. "They got away quick."

Last night's holdup was the third to occur here within four days and brought total cash loot of burglaries and robberies in that period to approximately \$150. Five burglaries reported earlier in the month caused citizens a loss of \$10.95 in cash and approximately \$500 in watches taken from the R. C. Aiken, Inc. jewelry store. None of the stick-up men or burglars who "pulled" these "jobs," in police parlance, has been apprehended.

Hoffman Assails Another Witness

TRENTON, N. J., Feb. 27.—(P)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman today attacked the testimony of an-

other identification witness against Bruno Richard Hauptmann and, through that man's statements the testimony of Dr. John F. "Jafie" Condon, Lindbergh ransom intermediary.

Hoffman, who has already accused one identification witness of "lying", quoted from records in the files of the state police to show that Joseph Perrone, Bronx taxicab driver, believed he had seen men resembling the kidnaped several times before he identified Hauptmann after his arrest.

Perrone testified at Flemington that Hauptmann was the man who gave him \$1 on the night of March 12, 1932 to deliver to Condon a note containing directions how to contact the kidnaper. The \$50,000 ransom was paid the night of April 2.
