Bible School For Laymen Winds Up

The Laymen's 10-day bible school conducted at the Evangelistic tabernacle under auspices of the Northwest district of the Assemblies of God closed its session Thursday night, with 250 persons attending the final session. The school was a marked success, attendance averaging about the 100 mark.

In the closing services, District Prebyter Rev. Cecil Ahalt of Portland spoke in the afternoon and Rev. Thomas A. Sandall, Northwest district superintendent of the assemblies, spoke in the night on "The Christian Valuation of a Child."

Woman Arrested Upon Old Charge

Arrested on a bench warrant from justice court here issued more than three years ago, Vilma Edgar, former local woman, was held before Justice of the Peace Miller Hayden yesterday to answer an old charge of giving a worthless check.

The woman was arrested in Portland yesterday by state police. She was originally arrested on the charge in 1933, and hearing set for February 21, 1933. She failed to appear for the hearing and a bench warrant was issued immediately, but the woman was not found until this week.

She will have a preliminary hearing on the charge this morning at 10 o'clock before Judge Hayden, and meantime is in the county jail in lieu of \$250 bail. The check involved was for \$20 and was given to the Busick Court street market.
