

Beavers Hurdle Oregon, Stay in Race

Palmberg Has Sixteen to Go

Oregon State Star Ahead of Schedule in Effort to Smash Records

CORVALLIS, Feb. 28.—(AP)—Wally Palmberg scored 14 points as he led the Oregon State basketball team to a 25 to 23 victory over Oregon here tonight, keeping the Beavers in the running for the northern division coast conference championship. The Orangemen were ahead at halftime 18 to 13.

The Webfoots provided dogged opposition throughout the battle. They jumped to a 4 to 2 lead shortly after the opening gun but quickly lost the advantage and from then on were fighting desperately a few points in the rear.

The Beavers pulled away slowly in the first period, and built their margin to 5 points at midgame.

At the start of the second half the Beavers spurred to a 13 point lead—29 to 16—before Silver dropped in the first Oregon field goal of the period with but eight minutes left to play. From then on the game turned into a roaring offensive battle, the Webfoots raining baskets from all angles and the Beavers also throwing caution to the winds in an effort to hold the edge. Both teams were freshened by substitutes repeatedly.

Close to Record
Palmberg, in plugging up his 14 points came within 15 of the record set by Galer of Washington. Palmberg has two games left to play. He boosted his total to 161.

Palmberg set the pace tonight, six points ahead of Lewis who garnered 8 for Oregon. The Stater star topped in six field goals and two free throws.

Oregon State has won 10 and lost four in conference play. The Huskies have won 11 and lost three. Other teams do not figure in the title race. The Beavers need both games in next week's series with Washington if they are to repeat for the northern division championship.

The Huskies were so far out in front up to 10 days ago that no more than a bare mathematical chance was conceded the Beavers but defeats by Idaho and Washington State changed the picture.

The deciding series will be played at Seattle March 6 and 7.
