

60 Men Plan Broader Program for Chamber Work at Stayton

2 Classes of Members Set

Lee Brown, Newly Named President, at Helm as Year Starts

STAYTON, Feb. 29.—So successful was the "men's dinner" sponsored by the chamber of commerce, Wednesday night, that it is planned to hold them frequently. Sixty men attended, indicating that they were in favor of such gatherings and behind the organization, so it was voted to hold a like affair Wednesday, March 11.

Lee Brown, newly elected president, presided and proposed that the chamber should broaden its activities to include the promotion of social, musical and cultural propositions here.

Grant Murphy, vice-president and a former president, spoke on the achievements of the organization and the importance of keeping it active so that the community would have a representative organization in public matters to its benefit.
