## Want to Print All Resolves

Resolution Forwarded Editor of Grange Bulletin, Roseburg

SILVERTON, Feb. 29. — The Silverton grange Friday night passed a resolution recommending the next state grange convention make mandatory upon the Oregon State Grange Bulletin publication of any resolution adopted by any Pomona grange of the state within 30 days of receipt of such a resolution in the office of the editor.

Commander James Scarth and Adjutant Larry Austin are asking if such members to notify them if they are unable to attend Monday night's meeting.

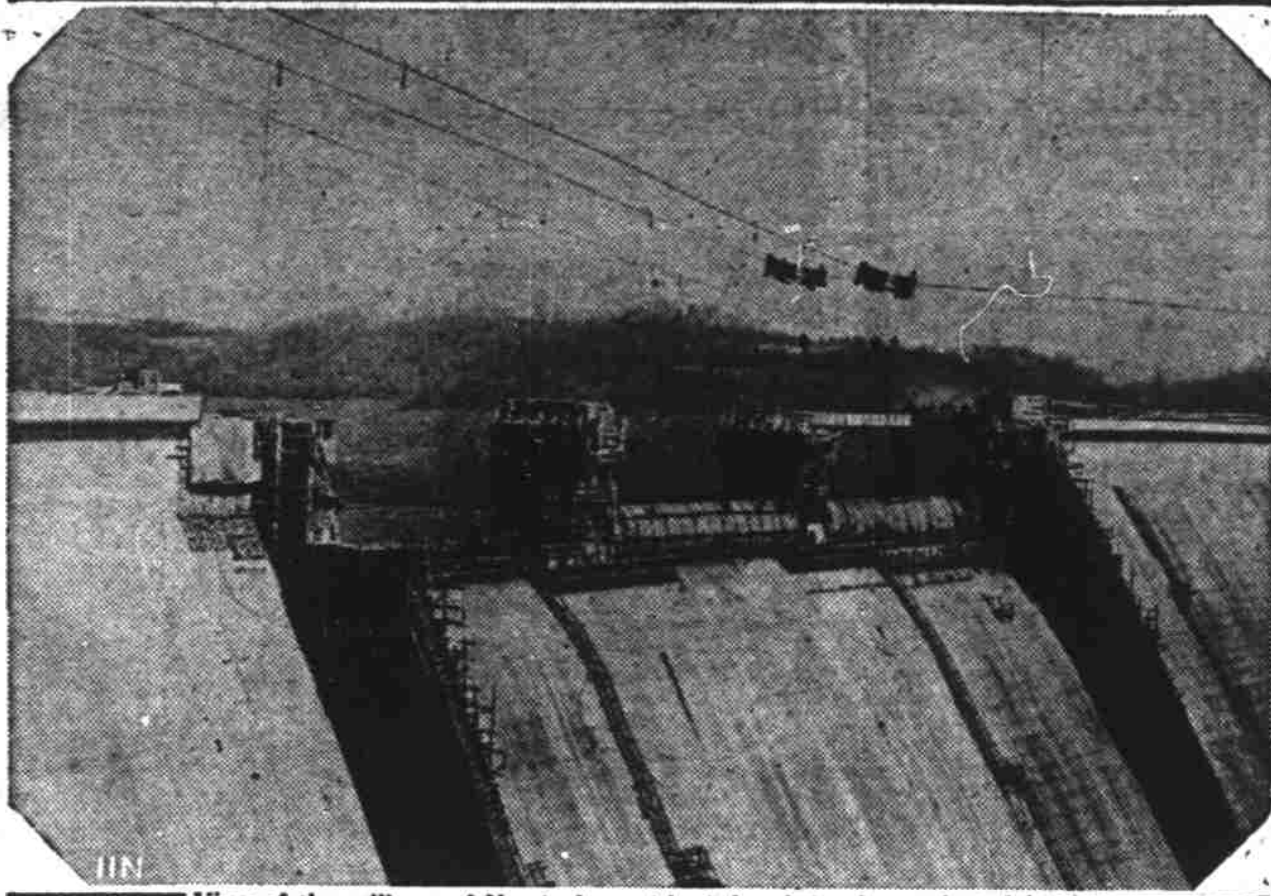
## W. A. Martin Back at Turner For Short Visit

## Unusual View of Norris Dam, Nearly Finished

Norris dam, part of the huge TVA power project, now approved by the U. S. supreme court, is nearing completion on the Clinch river, near Knoxville, Tenn. This latest view of the dam shows the beginning of work on the last link necessary to complete the structure. At the left, through which may be seen the rapidly-rising Norris lake, is the spillway where only one more drum gate is required. At the right, the first of six girders that will sustain a 300-foot bridge across the spillway, is being lowered. The girders are 112 feet long and weigh 40 tons each.

## "Princess Mary" Known to Folks About Rickreall

RICKREALL, Feb. 29.—Much has been said recently about "Princess Mary" of the Grand Ronde reservation who lived to be more than 100 years old.

She was a cousin of Captain John Smith and was of the Umpqua tribe and was brought to the Grand Ronde in 1856. The Umpqua and the Kikikittas were each small in number so they were all placed at Grand Ronde. Presumably this decision was made at Table Rock council in 1853.

"Princess Mary" was part of early history of Rickreall because she and her children, also Kitty and Susie, would camp on the creek near the Goff home for days and dispose of their baskets. Usually this was in the early fall when they would go on to the state fair.
