Anything Goes Is at Elsinore

Crosby, Grace Bradley in Cast; Crooner Gets in Serious Jam

Parodies of "You're the Top," the song that made America "top" conscious, enliven the Paramount presentation of "Anything Goes," which opens today at the Elsinore theatre.

Dr. Bonsall Will Be Speaker Here

Needs of Youth Topic as Church Groups Unite in Series of Meetings

Common needs of youth will bring together church members of Salem and the members of churches in many nearby towns for a series of meetings to be held here March 4 at the First Presbyterian church, with Dr. E. H. Bonsall of Philadelphia the speaker. The climax will be a mass meeting at 7:30 o'clock that night to be attended by both young and old members of all churches.

Dr. Bonsall will be chief speaker at the older girls' conference now in session in Eugene and is conducting a nation-wide series of young people's meetings on the theme "Christian Youth Building a New World." He is widely known as director of a youth program of the International Council of Religious Education and was borrowed by the Federal Council of Churches for the work he is now doing.

At the sessions here, two discussion groups will meet with the visitor during the afternoon for round table consideration of problems facing young people and their leaders today. At 1:30 o'clock, pastors, Sunday school superintendents and teachers, professional workers and adult advisers of Christian Endeavor, Boy Scouts, Girl Reserve, Camp Fire Girls, Epworth league, B.Y. P. U., missionary and other church youth groups will meet with him.

At 4 o'clock, young people holding offices as leaders and members of cabinets in youth groups will discuss their needs. No registration fee will be charged but an offering will be taken at the evening mass meeting.

Miss Mildred Bartholomew, director of religious education at the First Methodist church here, is general chairman for the mass meeting, and special music will be furnished by youths of the various local churches. Donald Douris is chairman of the publicity committee, with Miss Opal Yates, Miss Mary Krueger and Miss Virginia Boyls his assistants.
