Golf Course Hits Financial Snags

Meeting Called Friday to Attempt Saving Club For This Year

ALBANY, March 4.—Foreclosure of the property of the Albany Holding company which consists of the Knox Butte golf course was commenced here when Marks & McMahan prepared to file papers for the recovery of \$5,000 principal, and interest amounting to approximately \$1600.

The golf club was organized in 1922 and the property was bought for \$7,500. The following year a club house was erected at a cost of \$4500, a water system costing \$2500, and another \$2000 had been spent in laying out the course.

During the past month an effort has been made to organize a new company through which the assets from the old holding company which are now being held by the Leiningers, might be purchased.

A meeting has been called by President C. H. Howard of the Linn County Club for Friday night at the Hotel Albany to elect officers and to try to make arrangements to continue the club at least for the present year.

The course would be run as a private golf course.
