Rice promised formally "as in the past, will give my best efforts to the duties of the office." He asked that the single word, "incumbent," be printed after his name on the ballot.

Cole made no statement of policy and offered no statement for the ballot. He ran unsuccessfully against Rice two years ago.

## Attendance Light Due to Illnesses

Attendance at Salem high school last month reached the lowest percentage of total active enrollment in the memory of Fred D. Wolf as principal. Wolf said yesterday. The average daily attendance was 93.7 per cent of the 1532 names on the active rolls.

Total enrollment since last fall has reached 1632. Wolf said influenza and colds which apparently caused the heavy daily absentee lists appeared on the wane with attendance returning to normalcy. Whereas two weeks ago nearly 150 students were absent daily, yesterday only 104 were not attending classes. Although considerable influenza has been reported among school children, it is unlikely that any local schools will be ordered closed, Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, indicated yesterday. He believed that the present warm weather would cut down the extent of the disease.
