

Local News Briefs

Look for Payments—Several hundred Marion county farmers are looking forward to receiving checks aggregating \$25,000. The payments will be made as fast as the old AAA organization can disburse funds appropriated by the present congress for the payment of claims which were to have been made from the proceeds of processing taxes. Local farmers are to be paid on 1935 corn-hog contracts and on 1935 wheat contracts. All the requisitions for payment have been completed, compliance with the production control has been verified, and the claims have been forwarded to Washington.

Reports Edited—Editing of the reports of the recently conducted agricultural conference held in this county is now going on at Oregon State college, Harry Riches, county agent, reported yesterday. A group of farm leaders in the county are soliciting funds so the reports may be printed and distributed to 5000 farmers in the county.

Big Tax Paid—The Southern Pacific company this week paid its annual tax to Marion county in single checks calling for \$66,897. By a single payment the company won a three per cent discount.

Offices to be Moved—Removal of offices of the utilities department of state government from the state office building to the Market building, North Commercial street, is scheduled for the weekend of March 14, according to official announcement yesterday. Preparations of new quarters, under a three-year lease on the Market building, are going forward rapidly. As soon as the utilities commissioner removes his quarters from the state office building, the newly created unemployment insurance commission will set up offices on the fifth floor of the state office building. Flu Prevalent—Influenza and its frequent successor, pneumonia, accounted for a rise to 42 in the number of communicable disease cases reported in Marion county last week. Disease cases were as follows: Influenza 12, pneumonia 11, measles 7, chickenpox and mumps 4 each, scarlet fever 3, tuberculosis 1. Polk county cases included four of pneumonia, three of mumps, three of influenza, two of measles and one of scarlet fever.

One bill modifies fire zone requirements in the block bounded by 13th, 14th, State and Court streets, another changes the zone of lot 6, block 19, Depot addition, from class 2 to class 3, a third grants the Spa permission to erect a sign and the fourth permits the school district to vary from building code provisions in construction of the new senior high school.

Found Not Guilty—Phillip Kinney and Fred Cleveland, given a preliminary hearing in justice court yesterday on a charge of larceny by bailie, were released when the court held that there was not sufficient evidence to hold them. Cleveland, named on the warrant but not apprehended previous to yesterday, came into court on his own accord.

Wrong License—Pedro Tablanza, said to be a resident of California who has been working in a hopyard near here, was arrested yesterday on a charge of improper license plates, in that his car bore California plates while he was gainfully employed in Oregon. He denied the charge and will have a hearing before Justice of the Peace Hayden this morning at 11 o'clock. Meantime he is in the county jail in lieu of \$25 bail.
