

One WPA Project Held Up, Another Starts at Monmouth

Too Few Work On Sewing Job

Ash Creek Drainage Project Gets Under Way; Ten Are Employed

MONMOUTH, March 7.—Development of the WPA sewing project here are on a standstill. Only a small number of applicants for work were able to qualify, according to relief status, and it is probable that an arrangement may be perfected in which Monmouth and Independence women, who are eligible, will be given work on the project to insure a sufficiently large group to carry on. Mrs. G. H. Reynolds, Monmouth, who has been named sewing-room supervisor, is hopeful that all details may be settled soon. Mayor Bowser is endeavoring to get the project into action as soon as possible. Official approval from WPA headquarters in Washington, D. C. will be necessary.

Work has begun on a WPA project involving both Monmouth and Independence, known as the Ash Creek project. The purpose of this is to clear and straighten Ash creek between Monmouth, where drainage from the Monmouth city sewer outlet enters, to the Willamette river. Fred Holman of Dallas is directing the work, employing seven men from Monmouth and three from Independence. More will be employed according to plans. The project cost is to be about \$13,000. Residents of northeast Monmouth are in hopes that this will eliminate the mosquito menace which has proved very annoying in recent years, in that section of town.

Dean Morse Is Speaker At Monmouth Luncheon Club's Ladies' Night

The feature of the affair was an interesting talk by Dean Wayne L. Morse of the University of Oregon's law school. He gave an informative discussion of our country's form of government, and compared it with the British parliament. Our system has its critics, he admitted, but on the whole he believes the check and balance method is best adapted to our type of individualism. The English, on the other hand, being slower always to adopt new ways and means, but who are systematically thorough in working out and adopting all legal details, are probably best served through their form of government. Politics in England is a profession, he stated, while ordinarily in America, politicians get into office because the voters believe they merit election.

Crossed Plains With Partners in '52; Dies Aged 89 Years

STAYTON, March 7.—Peter Heater, age 89 years, passed away Thursday, March 5. He was born in Lee county, Iowa, December 9, 1846, the son of Lorenzo Dow and Sophia Morley Heater, who crossed the plains in 1852, settling on a donation land claim in the Union Hill district.

He was married to Elizabeth Scott, December 29, 1871, and lived on the old home place until 1911, when they moved to Silverton, where they resided until the death of Mrs. Heater, February 28, 1924. Since that time he had made his home with his son, Charles E., at Union Hill.

He is survived by four sons, Charles E. and Walter P., of Sublimity, Fred and John, of Adolph, Salem; and four daughters, Mrs. Etta Holman, Salem; Mrs. Pearl Decker, Portland; Mrs. Christina Merrifield and Mrs. Lora Matheny, Sublimity. He also leaves 15 grand children, 19 great grandchildren and two great-great grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the wedding and son chapel, Stayton, Sunday, March 8, at 1:30 p. m., and interment will be in the Union Hill cemetery.

Butter-Maker Is Awarded Diploma

MT. ANGEL, March 7.—John Bigler, Mt. Angel Cooperative Creamery buttermaker, was presented with the diploma for the most outstanding work as a buttermaker in the state of Oregon at the state convention of the Oregon Butter and Ice Cream Makers' association.

The award is highly prized as it is the only one issued each year and is the result of a monthly test of the butter of 108 creameries for the course of one year. The test is made at the Oregon Agricultural college. Two pounds of butter from each one of these creameries throughout the state is sent to the college each month where it is scored and tested. The butter from the Mt. Angel Creamery averaged the highest test.

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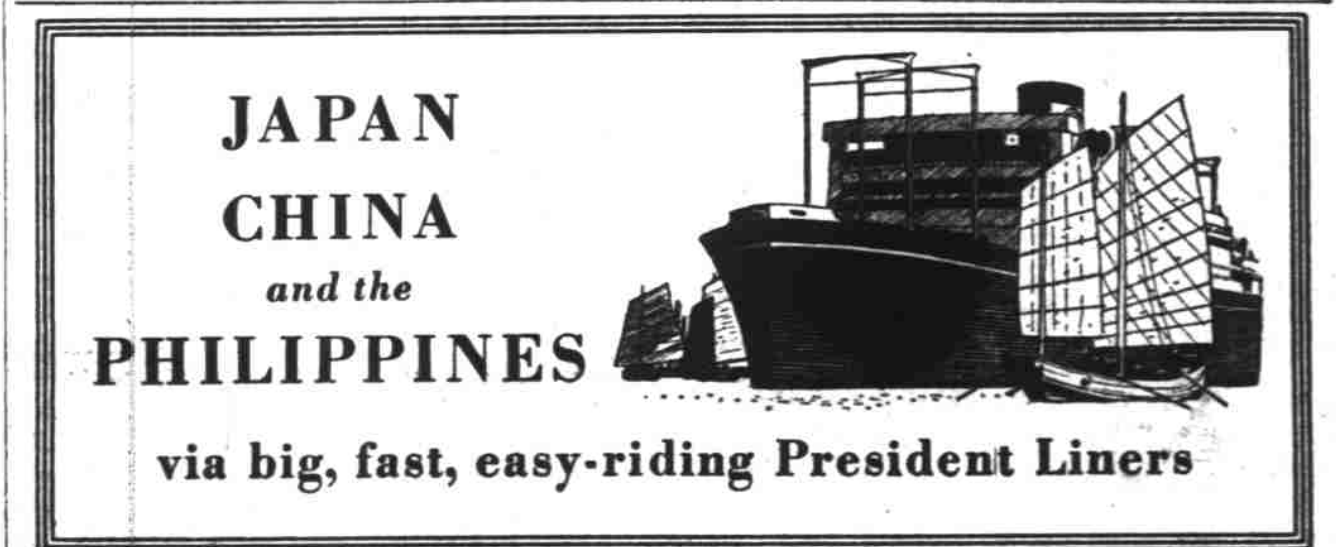
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
