Governor Predicts Great Future For Industry as He Turns Sod

with Mrs. Martin at his side, made the principal speech, saying in brief:
"Of all the places, Mt. Angel, through its cooperative efforts and fine record of accomplishment is the place to start the flax industry under free labor. Divorced from the state penitentiary. President Roosevelt has been much interested in this development, pointing out we import \$140,000,000 worth of flax products a year. There is no promotion in this—no Kiwanis or Lions club; but we do have to let the chamber of commerce in. A fine thing is that the farmers are the ones who are going to run it. We are beginning with the producers themselves in this cooperative."

Community Spirit Praised by Alcuin

The Reverend Father Alcuin of Mt. Angel praised the spirit of the people of Mt. Angel: "constructively building, conservatively progressive. Always the people must be satisfied that what they do meets the general good of the community."
Brief addresses also were made by O. L. Withers, president of the Mt. Angel Business Men's club, Frank Hettwer, representing the farmers' cooperative, and Mayor Jacob Berthold.

Others from a distance who were in attendance were: Secretary of State Earl Snell, L. L. Laws of the state flax industry, J. B. Meek, representing the state flax board, Walter W. R. May, manager of the Portland chamber of commerce, Marshall Dana, head of the northwest planning board.

Borah Withholds Name, California

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—Senator Borah today withheld tentatively at least — consent to enter his name in the California republican primary May 5 but even without it he had a full load of spring plowing ahead in his drive for the republican presidential nomination.

Charles A. Sunderling, a Los Angeles lawyer, announced in California that Borah would file in the primary there tonight to contest for the 48 delegates but the Idahoan replied that he had not consented.

Borah said supporters in California wanted him to campaign there but he did not feel he could get away from the senate long enough. He has until March 26—the filing deadline—to decide.

Follow Townsend, Says Mahoney, McMinnville

Coox bay harbor improvements, \$184,000.
Umpqua river jetty work, \$450,000.
The remaining 37 1/2 per cent of the estate, or approximately \$10,000,000, was allotted under the settlement of Smith Reynolds' brother, R. J. Reynolds, and two sisters, Mrs. Charles Babcock and Mrs. Henry Walker Bagley, to create charitable trusts.

French Insist On Evacuation

Germany Will Withdraw Peace Offer Unless Right Respected

pronouncement, the British were reported swinging to ward the French attitude and away from their middle-of-the-road conciliatory policy.

The remaining Locarno treaty members—Britain, France, Belgium and Italy—voted that the moving of troops into the demilitarized Rhineland "constituted a clear violation of articles 43 and 43 of the Versailles treaty and the Locarno pact."

Another session was called for tomorrow. The council of the League of Nations will meet here Saturday to take up Franco-Belgian appeals against the violation and many expected France might urge punishment of the Reich by sanctions.

France prepared for any eventuality. France went forward with military preparations for "any eventuality" in the Rhineland.

The British were obviously bitterly disappointed in Hitler's response to their plea, which they had hoped could be used to impress France and Belgium.

Italy, cast into a strange role by the situation because of sanctions against her, was solely represented by Dino Grandi, the Italian ambassador to London, who apparently was most passive during the talks.

The talks were continued informally tonight at a dinner given by Eden, which seven Frenchmen, six Belgians and 13 Britons attended.

Farm Program to Be Launched Soon

CHICAGO, March 12.—(AP)—The administration's new farm program will be put into full operation next week. Agricultural Administrator Chester C. Davis said tonight.

The administrator said that by midweek the farmers would be told definitely how much money they could expect to receive under the soil conservation act, and just what they must do to get it.

The work of correlating the recommendations of farm leaders on how the program could best be carried out in different sections of the country will be started in Chicago tomorrow.

Davis expressed pleasure at the response accorded the farm program, which is designed to restrict crop production and increase farm incomes by paying farmers for rotating from soil depleting to soil conserving crops.

Lobby Probers in More Hot Water

WASHINGTON, March 12.—(AP)—A multiplication of legal difficulties beset the senate lobby committee tonight, with indications that additional court attacks upon its seizure of telegrams soon would be instituted.

Informed quarters reported new efforts to enjoin the production of messages subpoenaed by the committee were under consideration and probably would be filed within a few days.

The committee's present legal involvements were two:
Charging an invasion of the freedom of the press, William Randolph Hearst sued today, through his counsel, Elisha Hanson, for an injunction to restrain the Western Union from delivering to the committee a subpoenaed telegram containing instructions to one of the publisher's editorial writers.

An injunction was granted yesterday by Chief Justice Wheat of the supreme court of the District of Columbia, who held that a blanket subpoena for unspecified telegrams of a Chicago law firm constituted illegal search and seizure.

Seek Settlement Of Gotham Strike

NEW YORK, March 12.—(AP)—Mayor F. H. La Guardia said tonight he planned to call another conference tomorrow, with Ferdinand Sisco, assistant secretary of agriculture, as arbitrator, to seek a settlement of the 12-day building service strike.
The mayor made known his plans on his return from Washington late today. In his absence an all night peace conference had broken up over the operators' refusal to grant the union's demand that all strikers be restored to their jobs.
Meanwhile William D. Rawlins, executive secretary of the realty board, said in a statement the "time now has passed" when a compromise might have been made and urged the strikers to return to work.
James J. Bambrick, union leader, steadfastly refused to recede from the position that re-employment of strikers was not a matter for arbitration; as the operators suggested.
