

### Spring Work Well Started

#### Mint Roots Dug to Plant on Washington Farm; Logans Injured

NORTH HOWELL, March 12.—Signs have been placed along the road from the Shannon corner south to the Russ corner, indicating work by the crew of men who are now clearing out the old fence row and digging the ditches on each side of the road between the Werner and Andrew Schmidt farms.
