Solution Looming In Albany Affair

Issues Ironed Out; Means
of Financing Sports
Will Be Sought

ALBANY, Ore., March 12.—(AP)—Problems on the Albany college campus, brought to a head in an address in which President Thomas W. Bibb charged "minority rule," an inefficient financial policy of the student body and "religious persecution" apparently neared a settlement today.

Faculty members and representatives of two student factions today made public a report, formulated at a private session last night, which said the undergraduate paper, "Orange Peel," hereafter will maintain an open forum column for free discussion.

Plan More Sessions

The report also said plans were being worked out to permit Albany's continuance in the Northwest athletic conference. Dr. Bibb advised against such participation, "unless student body finances are straightened out."

Other results of the meeting: A recommendation favoring further student-faculty sessions and a resolution finding unsupported the charge that student body leaders should be disqualified because of low scholastic standings.

Bessie E. Tarpley Funeral Saturday

Funeral services for Mrs. Bessie E. Tarpley, well-known Salem artist and civic worker, who died Monday at the family residence, 1623 Chemeketa street, will be held at St. Paul's Episcopal church Saturday, March 14, at 11 a.m. Rev. George Swift will officiate. Private entombment will take place at Mt. Crest Abbey mausoleum.

Mrs. Tarpley had lived in Salem for the last seven years, during which time she had taken an active part in community affairs. She was a member of the Salem Garden club and the Elsa Eileen drama class. Her floral water colors received wide acclaim.

She is survived by her husband, Louis H. Tarpley, and a son, Donald G. Tarpley, who is coming from New York for the funeral.

Silk Flag Sought For New Capitol

A silk state flag, with gold embroidery, would be an appreciated gift at the statehouse, it was learned yesterday.

Not that state officials are unappreciative of the splendid woolen flags which were handed them this week by the Oregon State Motor association.

But the original state flag, made and presented to the state a decade ago by Daughters of the War of 1812, was of heavy silk, lustrous, with hand embroidered escutcheon. The cost exceeded \$130.

One such flag will be sought for the new statehouse as the official "type" flag, it was learned yesterday.

Will Feminine Vote Decide?



"Which way is the women's vote going?" This question, once heard so frequently during years of presidential elections, is seldom voiced today. The reason apparently is because women's interest in politics has waned each year since they obtained suffrage rights in 1920. And past elections have shown that they do not stand together as a formidable united force for reform but are inclined to vote as the men of the family do. Nor do the young women who will cast their first presidential vote this year evidence any more interest than their mothers or older sisters. Interviews with representative young women in various sections of the country tend to support the conclusion that President Roosevelt will be the leading choice for the suffragist vote. But politicians attach much less importance to that vote today than 16 years ago when Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt led suffragists to victory.

Gosslin Predicts Democratic Gain

Roosevelt is going to sweep Oregon with a larger majority than the 78,000 margin secured in 1932, when the 1936 votes have been counted, W. L. Gosslin, private secretary to Governor Martin, reported yesterday. Gosslin returned to the office from a five-day political scouting trip which took him into ten counties in southwestern Oregon.

Gosslin predicted a majority of at least 100,000 for the president. He said he predicted a 25,000 to 50,000 majority in the 1932 campaign.

The secretary pointed out to democratic groups he met on the trip that Oregon had received upwards of \$250,000,000 from the federal government since the new administration came into power. He said Oregon people could not be "ungrateful" for the help the federal power had been to the state.

With Gosslin on the trip went Frank Tierney, executive secretary of the state democratic committee.

Gosslin is handling the political contact work for the present state administration. He said he would be active in the Roosevelt campaign this fall.

Unique Insurance Dispute in Court

Orville Ben Quigley died October 29, 1935, in a fall from an auxiliary high line at Bonneville dam.

October 31, the Midland National Life Insurance company returned a premium application, telling Quigley, whom the company did not know was dead, that he must pay a higher rate due to the hazardous occupation in which he was engaged.

Ruth Quigley, widow, is suing the insurance company for \$1500, face of the policy.

The insurance company says it did not issue a policy to Quigley when his application was received; that it accepted the application subject to approval by the company that Quigley had met all requirements for the rate quoted him.

Plaintiff contends that a policy was issued, a contract made and that the insurance company is liable.

Pleadings in the case have been filed in circuit court here, the defendant getting in its answer yesterday.
