Removal of 200 Feet of Footings Ordered by City Inspector

plus, which indicated material below the code minimum, he asserted that sample test cylinders had not been made properly. The test samples consist of concrete, as it comes from the mixer, cast into a cylinder approximately four inches in diameter and a foot long.

Hushnell said his order would not delay construction operations now in progress. The concrete he has ordered removed is in footings for the north wall of the fireproof corridor running east and west through the north wing of the building, along D street.

Copies Sent To Various Agencies
City Attorney Paul R. Hendricks prepared the removal notice at Hushnell's request. Copies were sent to the school board, the contractors' bonding company, and Knight & Howell, architects in charge for the board.

"You are hereby notified that the wall footings at column 3, East 7, in the Salem senior high school building have been constructed of materials in a manner that violates Ordinance No. 2466, being the building code of the city of Salem," the building inspector's order read.

Quoting from the code, it continued, "...plain concrete in walls and piers shall have a strength of not less than 1500 pounds per square inch..." and then it listed the outcome of tests, showing 670 pounds at seven and 1130 pounds at 28 days.

"Please be advised that said footings and foundations... must be replaced to conform with the provisions of the Salem building code," the order concluded.

Germany Indicted
The development, the major one of six days of negotiations and bickering among worried European powers, overshadowed a formal indictment of Germany by the League of Nations' council today as a violator of the Locarno and Versailles treaties.

The conference probably would be held in May, Germany, however, must consent to international forces policing the remilitarized Rhineland zone during the negotiations.

At the conference both Hitler's substitute peace proposals, which the French hitherto angrily refused to consider, and others as well would be considered.

The British emphasized Germany cannot hope to reestablish peace with western powers at the expense of Russia or her eastern neighbors.

Water Menacing Capital Recedes

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Potomac river flood waters slowly ebbed away from the national capital tonight after touching the foot of an emergency dike erected to protect government buildings.

The rest of the flood brought an 18.5 foot stage where the Potomac reaches tide water level.

Officials reported no damage to important government buildings. Two thousand storm drenched and tired relief workers and CCC enrollees released after a night and day of throwing up a sandbank and earthen dike.

Campbell Posts Bond, Gambling Indictments

It was Merle Kruger, sharp-shooting guard, who settled the Spats into their precision-like style in the second half to outclass, outrun and outpace the Fishermen. Kruger, who accounted for not a point in the first half, calmly potted five field goals from the corner in the second while every one of his team mates collected their share of points.

Even Steve Warren, center who has a reputation of getting his two points a game and no more, came through with nine points.

The hard-checking Sparrows held the Fishermen's four field goals in the second half which was a runaway affair from the early moments when Warren dropped one in to give Corvallis the lead. A minute before Ted Sarpola had dropped in a tough one hander to give Astoria the lead for the last time.

First Half Close, Thrills Provided
The first half was the most thrilling half hour the tournament has yet seen.

There were yet so few points scored that the two teams strove for the upper hand without either able to gain dominance. Kokko whose 10 points in the first half kept Astoria in the running, gave the initial blood to Astoria and the Fishermen held their lead throughout the half. Corvallis was never far behind and was always coming ahead. After Pippo scored late in the second period to make it 18 to 13 Corvallis started a swift attack that brought them even by run time. Blackledge ran into the basket to hole out a push shot. Warren, missing two free tries, flipped in a field goal on the rebound and Pflieger, missing one free throw, dropped in the next to tie it up.

Elmo Crockett, a sophomore, was high scorer with 12 points. Corvallis will meet Belfountain, B. camp, tonight at 7:30 o'clock. During the regular season the two Benton county teams split even.

President Heads Up Flood Relief

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—With muddy waters lapping near the White House, President Roosevelt today swiftly assumed the role of commander-in-chief of the federal forces fighting against the ravages of floods sweeping the east.

Within the space of an hour the chief executive took three actions. He postponed for at least 24 hours his southern fishing schedule; summoned a conference of his special flood aid committee; and appealed, in an executive proclamation, for \$3,000,000 in flood-aid contributions to the American Red Cross.

Declaring 200,000 people already had been driven from their homes in 11 states, he urged "our people to contribute promptly and most generously, so that sufficient funds may be available for the relief of these thousands."

Soon after he left the White House, despite a driving rain, for a personal survey of the invasion of the high-swollen Potomac river into the national capital. Accompanied by Mrs. Roosevelt and Secretary Dern, the chairman of his special flood committee, he watched the river rising steadily across Washington's lowlands.

The order would have reduced rates about 8 per cent and cut telephone company revenue approximately \$1000 a day.

A temporary restraining order was granted last October.

The judges today held the reduction would be confiscatory and in violation of the due process of law clause of the 14th constitutional amendment. They also said they took into consideration that the telephone company was not entitled to escape its share of the loss during business depression.

The decision was unanimous. Evidence in the case was heard three months ago.

ONTARIO, Ore., March 19.—(AP)—Justice of the Peace Thomas Jones announced a hearing for Pat Brennan, facing a charge of assault with intent to kill, will be held tomorrow. Brennan asked for a preliminary hearing when he was brought before the justice today.

Brennan, a retired railroad man, was charged with shooting Attorney W. E. Lees, sr., in a hotel lobby here last Saturday. Hospital attendants said today Lees was greatly improved and that they believed his recovery was assured.

Hill Named One Judge, Portland Kennel Show

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19.—(AP)—David I. Clough, president of the Portland kennel club which opens its annual two-day show here tomorrow, said fanciers were sending entrants from all western states and British Columbia. Judges include E. T. markets of the world. In this connection, I favor speedy enactment of a commodities exchange bill now before congress.

"I believe the American market belongs to the American farmer to the full extent of his ability to supply. It is opposed to any policy opening our markets to any foreign competition so long as our markets are able to supply."

"I would like to see bureaucratic government reduced to a minimum and the elimination of all unnecessary bureaus and commissions which are placing unbearable tax burdens on our people."

"I should make every effort in administering relief to eliminate all party politics. Most farmers to the needy with as little cost as possible in administration."

"I favor removing government from private business. Of course, there is hope that government is fields into which government must retire from all private business."

"I do not believe in the philosophy of scarcity. So long as millions are hungry I would not curtail production. I would rather pay the farmer to produce than to destroy."

"I am not in favor of inflation and neither do I favor deflation. I should like to see a stable dollar."

to the newly formed veterans of future wars.

The chief point in the manifesto is a demand for immediate payment of a bonus of \$1000 to each member of the national organization, conceived this week by Princeton students.

Hobart suggested three amendments which, he said, "were in line with the precedent which has been established since the world war."

These were:

"1. Demand at federal expense and of course at the expense of taxpayers free tuition and maintenance while here at Princeton, since it is possible that in the next war you will be damaged vocationally and may have to be rehabilitated. Why not do it now?"

"2. Demand at the same expense risk insurance, and

"3. Demand free hospitalization and a reasonable cash allowance in case of injury in civil pursuits."

"There is hope that you can arouse the best interests of the country," Hobart said.

WPA Probe Move To Have Support

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Speedy senate approval of the Davis resolution calling for a broad investigation of the Works Progress administration was predicted tonight by Senator Lewis of Illinois, the democratic whip.

The senate expenditures committee, of which Lewis is chairman, reported the resolution today after Senator Davis (R-Pa.), had charged that democrats were making a "political football" out of relief.

Senator Holt (D-W Va.) who yesterday demanded a nationwide investigation, said he was drafting a resolution to investigate relief operations and expenditures not only of WPA but of the old CWA and FERA as well.

Coincidentally, Chairman Buchanan (D-Tex.) said his house appropriations committee would take up some time next week President Roosevelt's request for an additional \$1,500,000,000 for the WPA after next July 1.

Showdown Looms In Hagood Ouster

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—A final showdown in the case of Maj. Gen. Johnson Hagood, whose reference to WPA funds as "stage money" stirred a two weeks storm in congress, has been scheduled for tomorrow—involving either his restoration to active duty on his retirement.

The White House announced tonight that President Roosevelt had granted the former commanding general of the 8th army corps a hearing through the intercession of an unnamed third person. He will confer with Hagood about his southbound special train en route to a Florida fishing cruise.

Hagood is now at his home in Charleston, S. C., "awaiting further orders" after removal from his eighth corps area post at San Antonio, Tex.

used its smashing sweep south through the center of Pennsylvania after devastating many cities in its northern valley—Williamsport, Lock Haven and Sunbury were particularly hard hit. At least 19 were dead along its course, 50,000 homeless, and water, flood, light and heat supplies cut off. Williamsport was laid waste by fire and flooding.

The Wyoming valley anthracite region was flooded to depths of 12 feet in spots.

Governor Earle proclaimed that "a serious emergency exists because of flooded conditions" and ordered all state liquor stores and liquor establishments closed throughout the flood areas.

The Connecticut Hartford and other towns in Connecticut and southern Massachusetts began to feel the fury of the flooded Connecticut river which had wreaked earlier devastation through Vermont and New Hampshire and northern Massachusetts.

The river was a 32 feet in Hartford and still rising. The city was threatened with the worst deluge in its history. Utilities were crippled and parts of the city were in darkness. At least one man was drowned. Hundreds of families were homeless and the damage was estimated unofficially in excess of \$5,000,000.

A score of streets were inundated and some 300 national guardsmen were mobilized to help evacuate hundreds of families.

The Pawtucket river, a 150 sweeping forward, forced scores to flee and factories to close.

In northern New England flood conditions generally were abating, but the situation in the Androscoggin valley of Maine was grave. Crisscrossing communication lines prevented complete details of the emergency there from becoming known.

Thomas Funeral Scheduled Today

INDEPENDENCE, March 19.—(AP)—R. D. Thomas, route two, Independence, died yesterday. He had lived all of his life in Marion and Polk counties. Funeral services will be held Friday, March 20, at 1 p. m.

He was born in Silvertown, March 22, 1867, and spent his younger life there. He was united in marriage to Mrs. Margaret Wild at Salem May 14, 1907. They came to Independence 15 years ago and have since resided here.

He is survived by his wife, Margaret Thomas, a son, Delbert Thomas, McMinnville; a sister, Mrs. Emma Bagley, Oregon City; two brothers, Carey Thomas, of Marquam; and J. D. Thomas, Silvertown.

Rev. R. W. Porter will officiate at the funeral services Friday. Interment will be in the Miller cemetery at Silvertown.

Island Source Study Goes On

Koon Delays Comment on Possibility; to Test Terrain, Planned

Engineer R. E. Koon said he was as yet unable to comment yesterday on reports that conditions on the North Santiam river and above Stayton were being found favorable to Salem's going there for its water supply.

"There is nothing to report," stated Koon, consulting engineer for the Salem water commission. "My men have just completed their field surveys there."

Koon will plot the survey lines on an aerial map of the island within a few days and then, armed with this data, study the island at first hand. If the terrain appears favorable in the light of the surveys, he probably will be able to recommend to the commission within 10 days that test pits be dug to determine if the underground formation will permit adequate infiltration of water from spring and the Santiam river.

"It will depend on what is found in these test holes," the engineer explained. "If a shallow rock formation is found, of course it will be useless to go further."

Should conditions on the island be found satisfactory, the commission would consider laying a network of perforated pipes at a depth of 15 feet or more and feeding the water filtering into this system through a tunnel under the north channel of the river to a supply line leading through Stayton to Salem.

The island supply is expected to be discussed informally at tonight's regular meeting of the commission at the water department offices at 8 o'clock.

Bilbo Is Flouted On Holmes Issue

WASHINGTON, March 19.—(AP)—Senator Bilbo (D-Miss.) lost his first major battle in the senate today when the nomination of Ed R. Holmes of Mississippi to the fifth circuit court of appeals was overwhelmingly confirmed, 50-4.

"The Man" Bilbo is an old political foe of Holmes, a federal district judge; or Holmes' father-in-law, the late Senator John

Sharp Williams, and of Senator Harrison (D-Miss.) who had sponsored the nomination.

In his first senate speech, Bilbo charged Holmes was "incompetent," "reckless," "stupid and vindictive," and, in addition, had sent him to jail for 10 days in 1932 for contempt of court for failing to answer a subpoena.

For five hours and more he poured out his charges.

Relief Committee Will Meet in Eugene Today

PORTLAND, Ore., March 19.—(AP)—Elmer Goudy, state relief administrator, said today the Oregon relief committee will meet in Eugene tomorrow to outline the program for assistance to the needy and blind. He said the plan approved by the federal government last week probably will be in operation by April 1.
