**Start Pension** In 10 Counties

Those in Which Payments **Have Been Made First** of Month Selected

PORTLAND, Ore., March 26-(P)-The state relief committee decided today old-age assistance will be forthcoming in 10 counties April first under Oregon's new social security program.

Baker, Columbia, Klamath, Lake, Lane, Lincoln, Union, Wallowa, Washington and Yamhill counties were chosen becausé benefits in those areas previously have been paid the first of the month and a delay would work a hardship on beneficiaties, the committee announced.

Other counties have been paying on the tenth of the month or at the end of each 30-day period. Start of the program in the remainder of the state will be rushed, it was declared. In May, a uniform date of payment will be inaugurated-on the fifth of each month

Checks to the first ten counties will approximate the amount those counties have been paying. Study Eligibility

committee said social workers in the various counties will make calls immediately on all persons receiving old-age payments from - the counties and that investigation will be made of public relief rolls to ascertain who may be eligible for old-age assistance.

A uniform property pledge blank was adopted.

The committee ruled that taxes will be considered as rent in determining amounts to be paid and that funeral costs cannot be paid with social security funds.

A statement given out by the relief committee showed approximately 6500 persons now receiving old-age assistance or relief under county pension plans and said the total probably would be boosted to 10,000 under the new program.

The present relief case load was listed between 12,000 and 13,000 families.
