Three Groups To Take Part

Presbyterian Church Has Annual Meeting and Elections

GERRVAIS, March 27.—Friday, April 3, has been designated as Achievement Day for the 4-H clubs of the grade school, the program to be given between 2 and 4 in the afternoon.

There are three clubs in Gervais this year: The Golden Stitches Sewing club with a membership of 12, led by Fern Foster is the largest club and the first to finish 100 per cent its work this year; The Happy Herders of French Prairie sheep club of seven members, led by Gordon Jones; and the French Prairie Pig club, led by J. C. Adams.

Because of the earliness of the season for the pig club boys, very few, if any, pig exhibits will be made. Mrs. Foster and her committee of 4-H club girls have arranged a pleasing and instructive program and exhibit for the occasion. All parents and friends are invited.

14 Members of Original Chamber Honored at Stayton Affair

STAYTON, March 27.—The chamber of commerce banquet Wednesday night was attended by more than 150 persons. Honored guests were 14 members of Stayton's first chamber of commerce, with their wives and a special table was arranged for them. Each of these "old timers," Willis Caldwell of Salem, D. B. Hill of Mill City, J. M. Ringo of Woodburn, C. A. Beauchamp, E. D. Alexander, Dr. W. N. Pinter, Joe Henderson, Jake Misler, C. P. Nelson, W. A. Weddle, O. V. Meyers, Jacob Spaniol, William Klecker and Dr. H. A. Beauchamp who was toastmaster, gave short talks.

Musical numbers were furnished by the chamber of commerce quartet string trio, and a duet by Rev. and Mrs. Ralph Kleen. This number, "On the Old Willamette" was written by John Williamson of Shedd and a former Stayton resident.

Talks on Education
The main address was given by Prof. E. T. Reed, head of the Oregon system of higher education. He represented President George Peary of S. C.

Prof. Reed told the gathering that "the normal schools, university and college are being operated today on 41 per cent less the sacrifice of faculty and the money than before 1932. With the sacrifice of faculty and the sacrifice of duplication the great benefits of the higher education have been gained."

"The enrollment in the various institutions has increased and today there is a better feeling between those institutions, than ever before. The situation is improving. Each day we are getting to a better understanding."

"The unification of the higher education system is proving a benefit to the downtrodden because before our normal schools were not being supported and today they are being properly cared for."
