Mrs. Southwick Will be Honored Today With Birthday Party

A LITTLE woman with curly silver hair, bright eyes and friendly manner is Mrs. Helen S. Southwick of 1163 Marion street, who celebrates her 88th birthday today. She lives alone in one of the houses built by her husband in that block and does all of her own housework. Long active in church and lodge circles, Mrs. Southwick still maintains her affiliation with several clubs. Helen Smith was born in Pine Plains, Dutchess county, New York, March 28, 1845. She moved to Wisconsin in early childhood and was reared there. November 24, 1867, she married Frank B. Southwick and in 1874 they came to Santa Rosa, Calif., to make their home for nine years. They moved to Salem in 1882 and bought property on what is now Marion street but then was in the country. Mr. Southwick was a contractor and erected houses the length of the 1160 block on Marion. He passed away eleven years ago. The reception this afternoon to which all friends are invited will be in the old family home at 1179 Marion now occupied by Ralph Southwick. Calling hours are from 3 to 5 o'clock. Last night Mrs. Southwick cooked and served dinner in her home to immediate members of the family. Mrs. Southwick is a charter member of the first Woman's Relief corps to be organized on the Pacific coast and was instrumental in organizing the Neighbors of Woodcraft in Salem. She traveled for a number of years as a lodge official. Her church is the First Methodist. As a member of the Woman's Home Missionary society, Mrs. Southwick took part in the establishment of the Old People's home here. There are four children living, Mrs. J. Hastings, Rollie Southwick and Ralph Southwick, all of Salem, and Mrs. Ralph Cox of San Francisco. Five others are dead.
