

Rivals Vie On Eastern Ballot

Senator Wants to Check Rise of Kansas Man in Last Weeks

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(AP)—A crowing of the campaigns to nominate Senator Borah of Idaho and Governor Landis of Kansas for the presidency loomed tonight, with the New Jersey primaries the field of meeting.

After weeks in which the Kansas strength with the state republican organization had become more apparent, Borah finally decided to have his name in when the vote comes May 19. Today was the last day of filing. New Jersey has 51 delegates.

Fast predictions that the two names would be in conflict in Ohio, Nebraska and California each had been belied by developments.

The action taken, Borah headquarters turned attention to more immediate matters such as the New York election of district delegates tomorrow. Some of the senator's most active supporters have been campaigning vigorously there for representation among the state's 30 delegates.

With two delegates from Virginia counted so far for Landis, the governor evidently stood to gain more in the state convention there April 11.

In the Maine republican convention tomorrow, selection of a delegation uninstructed, but partial to the nomination of Col. Frank Knox of Chicago generally was expected.

Democrats there had their pre-convention preparations behind them. The 19 delegates being pledged to President Roosevelt's renomination.

Both party headquarters in the national capital meanwhile had something to say looking to November. The democrats boasted that registration in the big California counties gave them 1,131,492 votes against 777,482 to the republicans, as compared with 713,926 and 1,039,893 respectively in 1932.

This was cited as illustrative of increased Roosevelt sentiment. The counties named were Los Angeles, San Francisco, Alameda, Santa Clara, Fresno and San Diego.

During the day, usually well-informed republican sources at the capitol named former Governor Lowden of Illinois as likely to be the keynote speaker at the June convention. Chairman Fletcher said in a statement, however, that "no selection will be made for this position" until the arrangements committee meets in Cleveland on April 21.

Board to Discuss Report of Jurors

Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, said last night he did not contemplate making an early reply to criticism of the health department made in a grand jury report Tuesday. He plans first to discuss the report with Mrs. David Wright, chairman, and other members of the department's executive board. Mrs. Wright is out of the city.

Mr. Douglas said he had read the report with care. He said he would go over it very carefully with his board and would relate the exact circumstances around the case about which the jury complains.

35 Indicted Men Plead Innocent

ASTORIA, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—Thirty-five men indicted in connection with a labor riot at the Crown Willamette logging camp on March 7 in which two men were killed pleaded innocent in circuit court today. The men are charged with rioting. Appeals for individual trials were granted. Defense reserved 10 days in which to file motions for change of venue. First trial date was set tentatively for April 27.

Baer Case May Pend Until Fall

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—H. M. Easterly, secretary of the Walter Baer defense committee, said today efforts will be made to release Baer on bail. Baer is in New York awaiting the outcome of deportation proceedings. A wire from Senator Charles McNary (R-Ore.) informed Easterly today that a habeas corpus writ pending in the circuit court of appeals might result in holding the case until next fall.

Communicable Diseases Spreading

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—New cases of communicable diseases in Oregon last week included 416 of measles, 159 of influenza and 53 of pneumonia, the state board of health said today. The report also urged care in avoiding typhoid fever, cases of which were reported in Washington, Jackson and Klamath counties. The fever is a "filth-borne disease" which may be caused by "insufficient local supervision of the water supply," the board said.

Icy Pavement Brings Deaths

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—Icy pavement cost the life of one person and injuries to two others early today. R. J. A. Johnson of Portland was killed and Oswald Nielsen of Newport and Lillian Hill of Portland were injured when their car skidded on a bridge and struck a ramp.

Grand Army to Participate in Meet

EUGENE, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—Frederick E. Davis, commander of the Sons of Union Veterans, said today the annual encampment of societies affiliated with the Grand Army of the Republic will be held in Medford June 16 to 18. No Grand Army encampment will be held this year but many members probably will attend the meetings here, Davis said.

Makes Long Drive in Wrong Car

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—T. Shoemaker of Clatskanie drove home from Portland—78 miles—only to discover he had the wrong car. He assured a motor company to which the car was registered he would return it at once and obtain his own auto from a parking lot at which he left it here.

Ships Back in Celilo Canal

THE DALLES, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—Ships traversed the Celilo canal today following completion of repairs. The canal was closed a week ago.

Super-Airport Begun

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1.—(AP)—Construction of Portland's super-airport began today with ceremonies at which WPA, city and port officials turned over snow-covered ground to signalize the start of the project.

Minimum Wages on Papers Agreed To

Former Editorial Workers to Go Back After 6 Weeks of Strike

MILWAUKEE, April 1.—(AP)—Milwaukee's largest newspapers today announced employment policies which provided for minimum wages, vacations, sick leave and dismissal bonuses for editorial workers.

In notices posted on news room bulletin boards, the Journal announced a minimum wage of \$40 for a 40-hour week for experienced men and the Wisconsin News a daily wage minimum of \$3. Both are afternoon papers.

It was understood the Sentinel, morning paper, was preparing individual notices to staff members embodying substantially the same provisions as the other papers.

Men with less than three year's experience are to receive not less than \$25 a week.

In its notice, the Wisconsin News, a Hearst newspaper, at which editorial workers belonging to the Milwaukee newspaper guild have been on strike since February 17, said:

"Former editorial employees now on strike will be taken back if they return to work within one week.

"The management welcomes and always has welcomed discussion of grievances with its employees or their representatives."

Prior to the news strikes, the guild, which has units in all three newspapers, submitted contracts to the managements. Refusal of the news management to sign precipitated the walkout.

Walp Says He Was Planning Suicide

Fled Down Alley Near Car of Honeycutt, Claims Slayer of Wife

restaurant on North Capitol street, Honeycutt said, and then took her home. "I never was in the habit of going to the door with her or waiting until I saw her parents were there," he said. "She had noticed the lights were all on in the house and had said her parents were undoubtedly home."

Honeycutt early Wednesday said he had thought it wise not to enter the house after the shooting but to try to catch the killer as he escaped.

Used Neighbor's Axe To Force Door Open

Walp's confession brought out the fact that he had taken an axe from a home near the Walkers' and had used the axe to get into the house through the back door. He then had rummaged through the basement seeking some of his effects and had searched through Mrs. Walp's bedroom where he had found the revolver with which he shot her four times. In the interim between the time he broke into the house and the time when he killed his former wife, Walp took 15 minutes to leave the residence and to buy himself a glass of beer.

He said he came to Salem from Eugene on Sunday night and took a room at a local hotel. He then counseled with a friend of his former wife seeking to have her effect a reconciliation between them. Officers last night withheld her name but said her story checked with Walp's. She said she was with Walp about 9 p. m. the night of the shooting and that he told her he would be gone the next night indicating he was going to take his own life.

Evidence to be Given Before Jury

District Attorney Trindle said yesterday he believed the case clearly one of premeditated murder. He said Walp had planned the crime and had shown complete coolness in staging the fatal shooting. Trindle said it would be necessary in a first-degree murder case, even if Walp should not stand trial, to place the evidence before a jury and to have the jury determine the sentence. Trindle said he would expedite the case as much as possible.

Walp half-reclined on a cot at the city jail yesterday and smoked cigarettes incessantly. He read fitfully from magazines supplied to him. He is of medium height, thin, with dark-complexion and dark hair.

Coroner L. E. Barrick said yesterday there was no need for an inquest. He said Mrs. Walp had been shot four times and that three of the bullets could have been fatal.

New Officer Gets Credit for Capture

Walp's presence in the downtown hotel following the shooting was discovered, it developed yesterday, by the newest member of the city police force, Patrolman Claude Litchfield. Inquiring regarding a man of Walp's description, Litchfield found that Walp had registered at the hotel under the name of Harry L. Thomas and gave his address as Eugene. Litchfield called two other officers and the three went to Walp's room.

Walp, they said, opened his door only after they threatened to throw a tear gas bomb over the transom.

At the district attorney's request City Engineer Hugh Rogers and his staff spent most of yesterday forenoon taking measures of the J. P. Walker lot and house at 335 Union street. Based on these measurements, detailed drawings of the premises, of the locations of Mrs. Walp's body, of empty cartridges, of bullet holes and of furnishings of the house.

Rogers said it was determined yesterday morning that one bullet passed through the east wall of the house, from the dining room and probably buried itself in a neighboring wall. One bullet was

found lying on the dining room floor and a third under the dead woman's body. The fourth was believed to be remaining in the body.

Chief of Police Frank A. Minto last night declared neither Mrs. Walp nor her parents had called on him for police protection Tuesday night, as reported at the scene of the crime. Night Sergeant J. L. Cutler also denied receiving such a request.

42 Per Cent Gain In Profits Told

NEW YORK, April 1.—(AP)—A tabulation issued by the National City bank today showed that 2,016 industrial, public utility and financial companies scored a 42 per cent increase in net earnings during 1935.

Combined net profits of these companies, less deficits, totaled about \$2,541,000,000 in 1935, compared with \$1,789,000,000 in 1934, an upswing of 42 per cent.

On the total net worth of \$49,324,000,000 for these companies the rate of return increased to 5.1 per cent in 1935 from 3.5 per cent in 1934.

"The totals for this group of leading companies," the survey said, "are only partially indicative of the results for all corporations in the United States, numbering over 500,000. They show only the trend of the year."
