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Eighty Students Receive NYA Aid

Normal Reports \$840 Monthly Available From Government

MONMOUTH, April 4.—The Oregon Normal school's NYA program, during the school year 1935-36, reports a total of 80 men and women students receiving Federal aid. The proportion is: Junior men, 13; junior women, 27; senior men, 10; senior women, 24. The amount of money available each month to supply this part-time work to needy students is \$840. The individual allotments range from \$5 to \$20 per month, with the average allotment \$10.78.

Besides being in need of the work, students to be eligible for it must have and maintain a grade average of C (average grade) or better. The projects at which students under this NYA work are employed include: Construction of charts and drawings, and care of animals and materials in the laboratory; recreation duties and clerical; construction of psychological demonstration equipment and caring for equipment; scoring and tabulating results of entrance tests and grade-point rank with high school records of students; and maintaining alumni files.
