

House-to-House Canvass of State Planned by Townsendites

Hope to Boost Member Lists

Non-Endorsed Candidates Won't Be Allowed to Talk at Meeting

PORTLAND, Ore., April 6.—(P)—Charles L. Paine of Eugene, Townsend campaign manager for Oregon, ordered today a house-to-house canvass of all registered voters in the state.

The survey will show Oregon's sentiment on the Townsend Pension Plan and bring the state membership from an estimated 130,000 to about 200,000, he predicted. He stated it was hoped to organize 130 more clubs in Oregon.

Each county will have a chairman, who will appoint club presidents or others to act as precinct captains.

"If we can be assured of one-third of the state voting strength, we will have nothing to worry about," Paine said.

He recently called upon all Oregon members to contribute five cents a week for six weeks toward the campaign chest. A club at Roseburg balked, accusing the state area board members with being self-seekers inasmuch as a number were candidates for office. Endorsed candidates for national offices will speak at a Townsend rally here Friday night. Candidates without the state Townsend board's endorsement may not be introduced, but will not be permitted to speak, Paine said.

Ayer said he was "highly indignant" at what he termed "practical boondoggling" when compared with needed improvement of the Pacific highway, which he said carries 60 per cent of state traffic.

Political Madness Theme of Pastor

ALBANY, April 6.—Taking as his subject, "Religion and Political Madness," Rev. Virgil F. Halbig, pastor of the Christian church of Albany, spoke to a large and attentive audience Friday night when the interchurch brotherhood met at the Evangelical church for the regular monthly meeting. Rev. Halbig covered a wide range of problems in social and government life which he designated as challenges to each individual of the churches who stand for better government and the elimination of numerous evils common in the life of society today.

"Our greatest need is the voting out of office those who do not stand for Christian ideals but for the spoils of office instead. We should return to the Christian ideals of our fathers in government which is service for the common good." He offered evidence to show that the anti-prohibitionists have never kept one promise made in the last presidential campaign. "The saloon had 295 years to prove its efficiency, and failed. Prohibition at its worst is better than legalized liquor laws at their best," said Mr. Halbig.

George Richards presided over the business meeting. Another meeting will be held just previous to the primary election at which time candidates and others will be asked to attend.
