St. Mary's to Have Vacation

Eight-Day Mission Closes After Drawing Big Attendances

MT. ANGEL, April 6.—Services for Holy Week will begin Wednesday night, with the singing of the Tenebrae at 7:30. Thursday morning there will be a high mass and communion for the entire parish at 9:00 o'clock. Communion will be distributed to the weak and infirm at 7:45 a. m. Sermon and Tenebrae at 7:30 p. m. Members of the various societies will take their turn at adoration hours, beginning after high mass Thursday and continuing through Thursday night until Good Friday morning.

Veneration of the Cross and Mass of the Pre-Sanctified will take place at 9:00 a. m. Friday. At 3:00 o'clock that afternoon the Way of the Cross will be said and will be followed at 7:30 p. m. by a sermon and Tenebrae. Saturday services will begin at 7:15 a. m. with the blessing of the Easter candle and baptismal water. In the evening at 7:30 solemn resurrection services will be held during which the young men and young women will march in procession.

Easter vacation for the children of St. Mary's grade school begins Thursday, April 9, and continues through the following Tuesday, classes reopening Wednesday morning, April 15. Holidays for the students of Mt. Angel college will begin on April 8 and end on April 15.
