

Churches at Dallas Are Co-operating for Holy Week Services

Good Friday's Rites at M. E.

Different Groups to Hold Own Special Events Easter Sunday

DALLAS, April 7.—Cooperating churches of Dallas will observe Holy Week in two union services preparatory to Sunday's special Easter programs in the several churches.

Wednesday at 7:30 p. m. a union service will be held in the Presbyterian church to commemorate the establishment of the Lord's Supper. Rev. H. E. Widmer of Grace Methodist church will have charge of the program. Rev. John L. Linn of the Methodist church will deliver the address. Rev. Alfred M. Williams of the Presbyterian church and Rev. H. F. Rossiter of the Alliance church will serve this communion. Representative laymen from several churches will assist.

Mrs. Spaulding will sing. Good Friday service will be held at the Methodist church from 2 to 4 p. m. in commemoration of the death of Christ on the cross. The choir will be composed of singers from the Salt Creek Baptist church. Mrs. Bruce Spaulding will sing a solo. "Jesus' Seven Words from the Cross" will be presented in 10 and 15 minute periods. The people may come or go during the musical interludes. The Good Friday program follows:

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Parking Gets Council's Ear

Various Applications and Requests Come Up Before Dads

SILVERTON, April 7.—The parking situation at Silverton was discussed at some length at the April meeting of the city council held Monday night. Members of the council thought the Main street parking spaces should be marked off. Arthur Dahl, chief of police, expressed the opinion that instead of marking off the street to make room for more parking, less parking along this street should be the rule.

Dahl explained that as cars parked now, diagonally, and as narrow as the streets are, the parking situation becomes entirely too crowded. If cars were made to park horizontally and more parking than absolutely necessary discouraged, the traffic situation would be relieved.

However, the council voted to mark the street diagonally from Water to Second street.

Ask Street Light

Prior to the council meeting a group of members from the Modern Woodmen of the World and the Knights of Pythias met with the council in an effort to secure a street light for the north end of Third street in front of the M. W. A. hall and back to the Pythian hall and to have some effort put forth to remove the old house on Mill street, which the committee said, was a fire menace to both lodge halls.

The recorder was instructed to write a letter to the owner of the building urging him to wreck or repair the house. On the large committees were Clyde Ramsby, Bert Green and John Thurman of the M. W. A. and John Fishwood and Scott McPile from the Pythian order.

Donald M. Baker, recently of Salem, applied for a recommendation for a liquor package license to sell at 205 North Water street.

The application was recommended. An application was recommended for a special police by Veterans of Foreign wars for a boxing match March 4 was granted. No special police was furnished, it was pointed out.

Talk Property Sale

The selling of city property was discussed, with special reference to a house on North Church street. The matter was left in the hands of the finance committee. A request for lights on Bartlett, Norway and Third streets was discussed and left in the hands of the health, fire and water committee to report back at the next meeting of the city council.

The matter of purchasing another stove for the city park was left in the hands of the park committee. Dr. C. R. Wilson, a member of this committee, reported that he had been told of a good stove he could secure reasonably. The street committee was given power to investigate requests for gravel and to secure this for places on streets where it was particularly needed. The alley way at the armory and a portion of center street, were two locations where it was reported that gravel was needed.
