Future Farmers to Hold Convention

INDEPENDENCE, April 11 — The State Future Farmers convention will meet in Corvallis on April 30, May 1 and 2, when future farmers from the entire state meet in a lively educational gathering. Howard Bennett, local agricultural instructor, will attend this state meet with about ten local boys.

A campus tour will be the chief attraction the first day, while the next morning will be devoted to contests and demonstrations by the FFA boys. Following this will be the awarding of ribbons and prizes to the winners. A few of the contests to be held are: a general demonstration contest, in which two boys may give any kind of an exhibition they wish; farm mechanics contest; horticultural contest, which concerns budding and grafting; dairy cow valuation; farm accounting; farm crop; a contest on potato grading and seed-corn selection; and a draft horse judging contest, which is sponsored by the American Horse and Mule association. Prizes amounting to \$50 will be awarded. A mock auction will be held the following morning, giving the contestants a chance to bid on livestock.
