Russia to Revise Production Plan



A general revision of the Stakhanoff production system with which the Russian soviet sought to revolutionize its industrial development program is now under way with officials and observers alike uncertain as to the eventual success of the plan. According to all recent reports, the Stakhanoff "specialization" plan for industry and agriculture has failed to produce the results anticipated to date. The system was introduced in the soviet by Alexei Grigoryevich Stakhanoff, pneumatic hammer operator in the Donbas mines and was adopted in Russia to "step up" all types of production. Hailed by Dictator Josef Stalin and other soviet leaders as revolutionary, it has not been entirely successful.
