

Dates for Monmouth Spring Carnival Set for Last of May

Will Conclude Memorial Day

Carnival Queen Contest to Be Held; Officers Are Named

MONMOUTH, April 18.—Plans are being completed for the second annual spring carnival at Monmouth, sponsored by the chamber of commerce, May 28, 29 and 30 are the dates set, and as Saturday, May 30, is Memorial Day, a patriotic program will be presented, including a band concert. A feature of the grand parade planned for Saturday will be an appropriate entry, probably in charge of the Legion posts of Polk county assisted by Spanish-American and other war veterans.

Mayor Bowersox is in charge of the carnival queen contest. Four entries have been made for queen and as there are five prizes to be offered, others are urged to enter. Each candidate must be sponsored by some organization or business firm. The first prize will be a spring ensemble. The other prizes will be dresses and these winners will serve as queen's attendants.

Dances will be held each night in the O. O. F. hall, directed by the Monmouth-Independence band the profits to be divided between the band and the carnival fund.

Brownings carnival attractions which were held last year are again signed to present about 20 concessions and entertainments of various sorts.

The foot parade Friday night will be an interesting feature. This will be comic and open to burlesque, musical and other acts which will be awarded to the most original and humorous entrants. Bands and other attractions will contribute to the parade. Homer Dadds and Paul Riley, field marshals last year, will act again this year.

The general committee: W. L. Smith, George Cooper, L. B. Howard and C. C. Powell are working to put on a bigger and better carnival than last year. Carnival headquarters are located at the law office of C. F. Gillette. He is president of the chamber of commerce and will assist the various committees, and have general charge of headquarters.

George Cooper will be in charge of the grand parade, Saturday; L. B. Howard will be in charge of the pet parade, and C. C. Powell will be in charge of advertising. Volunteer assistants are requested to work with the general chairman.

This is just a sketch of the many projects being formulated. The carnival is unquestionably destined to be a real achievement.
