Pools Are Found In Fair Condition

A survey of condition of the Olinger and Leslie swimming pools and equipment indicates that little repairing will be needed before the swimming season opens. Superintendent Sias Gaiser said yesterday he will report to the school board next Tuesday night. Preparatory work will consist chiefly of painting pools and bathroom interiors. Gaiser will recommend that wooden gratings be placed on the bathroom floors.

Because the new filter system permits water to be kept in the Olinger pool for indefinite periods without changing, Gaiser will recommend replacing the boiler damaged during the 1935 tank season, he said. The board will be advised only to provide means for heating shower water.

Trolley Wire Is Removed by O. E.

High street yesterday lost one more reminder of the days of heavy insulating electric railway travel through the Willamette valley when the Oregon Electric trolley wire was taken down by railway workmen.

Since the High street tracks through the business district were abandoned several years ago, the trolley line had been used as a power feeder for freight switching services. The railway company last week completed paving over its old track along the abandoned section.

Osbourne Appeal Coming Up Today

The state supreme court will sit en banc today in the appeal case of Joseph John Osbourne, serving a life sentence in the state penitentiary for the slaying of Simon Mish, Portland merchant. Osbourne was a former Portland police officer.

Attorneys for Osbourne are attacking the constitutionality of the law providing that 10 jurors may return a verdict of guilty in a criminal case, excepting first-degree murder.

Osbourne was convicted of second degree murder. His lawyers allege that the law was not legally enacted.

First Aid Car Is Still on Program

Reminded that the anniversary of the state capitol fire comes next Saturday, Mayor V. E. Kahn yesterday declared that he had not forgotten plans to raise funds for purchase of a first aid car to be dedicated to Floyd McMullen, call fireman who lost his life in the fire.

"I do not blame the first aid car committee for the delay in this plan," the mayor added. "They have met with obstacles difficult to overcome. But I hope some group will be able to conduct a drive for the necessary funds to obtain a first aid car for the city. In these days of heavy automobile traffic and with the swimming season approaching, Salem most certainly should have a well-equipped first aid service."

Men's Dormitory For W. U. Is Declared Desirable; Aden, McLeod Heard

Candidates for the six student body offices to be chosen in the annual election on the Willamette university campus this week presented traditional speeches in behalf of their candidacies at a special student association meeting yesterday morning in Waller hall.

Included in the platform promises of Dwight Aden, of Wilsonville, and George McLeod, Salem, candidates for the presidency, were plans for a men's dormitory on the campus, reduced student body fees, provision of larger funds for intramural sports and a more extensive associated student social calendar.

Aden is present second vice-president, while McLeod is one of the University's best known orators. Both are affiliated with Alpha Psi Delta fraternity.

Running for the first vice-presidency are Lillian Graham, Sherwood, and Rachel Pocom of Salem. Bill Hansen and Mel Viken, both of Portland, are the second vice-presidential position rivals, while Anna May Unrath, of Roseburg, opposes Lucille Brainard, Wardeur, Idaho, for the secretarial post.

Democratic Gains Shown in Figures

Union, Umatilla, Linn and Wallowa Registration Totals Significant

The democratic registration in Union county increased from 3793 two years ago to 4050 for the primary election this year, Secretary of State Snell reported Monday. The republican registration dropped from 3941 two years ago to 3913 this year. The total registration for this year was 8965 as against 7564 in 1934.

In Umatilla county the democratic registration jumped from 4038 in 1934 to 4405 this year, while the republican registration decreased from 7811 to 7118. This total registration this year was 11,552 as compared to 11,991 in 1934.

Linn county showed a democratic increase from 4851 in 1934 to 6046 this year. The republican registration also increased from 7248 two years ago to 5240 this year. Linn's total registration this year was 14,619 as against 12,484 in 1934.

More Men Picked For Park Project

154 on Job, Report From Resettlement Office; 100 Named Monday

Eighty four Salem men and 16 in the Silverton district were being notified yesterday to report this morning for work on the resettlement administration project in Silver Falls park. These are in addition to 56 other WPA laborers and five truck drivers already employed on this project.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 20.—(AP)—

The work of developing the Silver Creek Falls area east of Salem into an 800-acre state and national park started today with 154 workers clearing brush and fallen timber, the resettlement office reported.

W. A. Langille of Salem is manager of the project which includes acquisition of about 650 acres of cutover, burned over and second growth timber land.

The resettlement administration, financing the project for land use demonstration purposes, is purchasing marginal or sub-marginal farm land and will assist about 15 families to relocate on more productive land.

Inclusion of 2000 acres of public domain was expected.

Development work is planned and supervised by the national park service.

It will include trail and road building, fire protection and building of recreational facilities.

Working crews are drawn from WPA lists in the Salem area.

The 8000 acres, including attractive scenery, is roughly the watershed of the south fork of Silver Creek.

Irvine Favors Preparedness

Peace Urged by Speaker, But Internal Dangers Also Lurk, Warns

A plea for peace in a world of hatred and at the same time a demand that the United States be well and truly defended against internal and external foes, was brought to the Salem chamber of commerce yesterday noon by B. F. Irvine, editor of the Oregon Journal.

Irvine professed great fear of communism in the United States, declared there were 32 communist organizations now active in Portland and 100 newspapers fomenting a communist uprising in the United States.

He urged retention of compulsory military training in Oregon's educational institutions. "If we abandon military training we will be like Ethiopia; defenseless in a world where covetousness nations seek our lands," he declared.

With his plea for preparedness, Irvine declared war was an "unavoidable fact of life" and urged adoption of the Christian philosophy of life as "the best guide to human conduct ever given man. Were the golden rule to be put in practice, we would need no law and no police," he declared.

The speaker saw in fascism as great a menace as communism and predicted another conflict in Europe as an inevitable conclusion of hatreds there existing and the steady increase of population.

E. B. McNaughton, president of the First National bank of Portland, accompanied Mr. Irvine here.

Governor Martin, State Treasurer Holman and Secretary of State Snell were guests at the luncheon.

Governor Martin urged the chamber of commerce to interest itself in the development of mining and of flax in Oregon. "We need to create wealth in this state," Martin said. "We have too many fellows now who want only to spend it."

Democratic Gains Shown in Figures

Union, Umatilla, Linn and Wallowa Registration Totals Significant

The democratic registration in Union county increased from 3793 two years ago to 4050 for the primary election this year, Secretary of State Snell reported Monday. The republican registration dropped from 3941 two years ago to 3913 this year. The total registration for this year was 8965 as against 7564 in 1934.

In Umatilla county the democratic registration jumped from 4038 in 1934 to 4405 this year, while the republican registration decreased from 7811 to 7118. This total registration this year was 11,552 as compared to 11,991 in 1934.

Linn county showed a democratic increase from 4851 in 1934 to 6046 this year. The republican registration also increased from 7248 two years ago to 5240 this year. Linn's total registration this year was 14,619 as against 12,484 in 1934.
