Diphtheria Death First Since 1931

The death of Thomas Albert Earls, 6, of Labish district, Sunday was the first child fatality attributable to diphtheria to occur in Marion county since 1931. It was reported yesterday by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer. Funeral services for the boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Earls, were held here yesterday from the Salem Mortuary.

Dr. Douglas said heart, kidney and lung complications resulted from the diphtheria attack which the Earls boys suffered about seven weeks ago. He urged that all parents have their children immunized to diphtheria either by private physicians or at the health office to protect them from the disease.

Mexican Teacher Is Burned Alive

MEXICO CITY, April 21.—(AP)—A band of 70 armed insurgents burned Carlos Toledano, a school teacher, alive today and cut the ears off another teacher, Pablo Jimenez.

Shouting "Viva Christ the King" and "Viva Calles," the insurgents set upon the teachers after burning three official school buildings at Eltepequez, Buenavista, and Pochotita, in the state of Vera Cruz.

A detachment of eight federal soldiers from Tapacoyan pursued the attackers and, despite the difference in numbers, killed several of them, press dispatches from Tapacoyan said.

Bond Exchange by Bank Is Approved

Reflects Deal to Finish Building Paper Plant; Are Reorganizing

The Bank of Woodburn, in liquidation, was permitted by court order yesterday to trade two \$1,000 bonds against the Vancouver Kraft company at Port Mellon, B. C., for two \$225 bonds of the California-Oregon Paper Mills. The transfer is a part of a reorganization plan now in process for the Vancouver mill.

The bank will also receive two shares of preferred stock and four shares of common for each bond, in a new company to be organized to operate the Vancouver property.

The Port Mellon is affiliated with the Leadbetter paper plants. A bond issue against it went into default five years, the mill having never been completed. Plans now have been made to finance the completion of the mill and to provide working capital. Holders of the original bonds against the plant, by taking the securities of the California-Oregon Paper Mills of Los Angeles, receive securities from a company which has no other bonded debt.

All of the stock of the California company is owned by the Columbia River Paper Mills whose control is held by the Columbia River Paper company which also controls the Oregon Pulp & Paper company here.

The Vancouver, B. C. mill, when operating, will produce only kraft pulp.

Stringent Patrol Of Forests, Plan

Rigid patrol of Oregon forests this summer and particularly stringent supervision of logging operations in and near burned areas was decided upon yesterday by the state board of forestry. Governor Martin presided at the meeting.

Ten thousand dollars additional funds for the protection program will be needed this summer, the board was advised. If federal or county fire association monies are not available, the state emergency board will be asked for a special allocation.

The board approved additional lookout stations, new cabins and increased patrols along recreational streams this summer. Close cooperation will be maintained with CCC camps.

Elle Again Heads Teachers of City

The Salem Teachers' association re-elected M. J. Elle as president at the annual meeting held in the high school auditorium yesterday afternoon. Elle is a high school biology instructor.

Venue Change For Walp Not Sought

Harry Walp, accused of the murder of his divorced wife here March 31, will go on trial here next Monday and no change of venue will be sought, his attorney, Paul Burris, said yesterday. Parents of Walp, here from Eugene, advised against a change of venue. Walp is reported to be willing to admit second-degree murder. His defense against first-degree murder charges will be that he was not rational at the time of the slaying and that he did not plan the shooting in advance. He is alleged to have fired four shots into the body of his former wife as she ran from him after he had surprised her when she came home to her parent's house on 835 Union street.

Flax Outlook Best in Years, Governor Told

State officials in charge of the flax industry at the penitentiary advised Governor Martin yesterday that late rains throughout the valley this spring made the outlook for the 1936 flax crop one of the best in years. The state has 2000 acres planted to flax but will relinquish as much of this acreage as is needed to get the new setting and scutching plants under way at Springfield, Mt. Angel and near Molalla.

County Finances In Top Condition

Cash Exceeds Amounts of Appropriations and Warrants, Word

Marion county's finances are in a healthy condition according to the semi-annual reports of the county clerk, the county sheriff and the county treasurer, just released.

The close of the year 1935 found the funds of the county with cash on hand totalling \$297,303. All unpaid appropriations outstanding, together with warrants payable and accounts payable, did not aggregate as much as the cash.

The report of the clerk showed that taxes receivable for the years 1929 to 1935, inclusive, totalled \$601,534. While a reserve equaling this amount was married as a liability of the county, collections of the taxes were expected ultimately to reach at least 95 per cent of the amount carried on the books. The county's funds therefore would show most of the tax receivables of \$601,534 as assets. In addition the county shows unappropriated estimated surplus in its several funds of \$175,810.

The treasurer's report which accompanied that of the clerk showed a cash balance of all funds in the county of \$287,303.02 at the close of 1935. This included monies handled for school districts and cities. Receipts for the six months' period ending December 31, 1935, were \$680,550 for the treasurer; disbursements were \$767,834.

Charge Admitted In Battery Case

Charles M. Hinkle of Turnert was arrested yesterday for the second time in less than a month on an assault and battery charge. On this complaint, made by Grace Rhoades, a neighbor, he admitted guilt and was fined \$25 when brought before Justice of the Peace Miller B. Hayden.

The incident on which the complaint is based occurred March 9. Hinkle was bound over to the grand jury March 27 following a preliminary hearing on another assault and battery charge made against him by Leona Miller, also a neighbor. In the hearing last month, Mrs. Rhoades gave corroborative testimony for Mrs. Miller.
