

Lime Plant Conference Held; Difficulties Are Encountered

Holman Seeks To Cut Costs

Committee to Study Issue Is Appointed; Present Price Deemed High

State Treasurer Rufus C. Holman yesterday called a conference of farm leaders to seek means of lowering costs on state penitentiary lime for farmers but the conference bogged down when it was learned that costs of raw materials for the plants and costs of distributing lime to farmers prohibited a greater output at the state plant here.

Holman, undeterred by the difficulties, said the conference would continue until a solution of the lime plant problem is reached.

The treasurer appointed Dan J. Fry, state purchasing agent, Agricultural Director White, Professor C. V. Ruzek, soils department, Oregon State college, and L. L. Laws of the state penitentiary, as a committee to continue a study of the lime plant's problems.

Cost Problem Seen

White declared the problem was not the distribution facilities, but the cost to the farmers. He said the farmers could not pay the price now demanded, averaging \$4.75 a ton in bulk at the penitentiary. He stated the maximum should be \$3 per ton.

Professor Ruzek said "I don't believe you can interest our farmers to use lime more extensively unless the cost is lowered. At the present price of crops, it would be uneconomical to pay the price for lime."

Use of state highway trucks and National Guard trucks for hauling was abandoned when it was learned the former were all in use and the war department prohibited the use of military trucks for that purpose.

The capacity of the plant at the penitentiary was reported by Warden Lewis at 30 tons daily, which would employ 108 prisoners. Last month 21 tons of lime were sold.

Mayor Kuhn offered his cooperation to the labor council and pointed out that the drive was authorized by the city council by resolution last spring. Permits Out For Two More Homes

Two new houses and a store building were added yesterday to Salem's growing record of new construction for 1936. These three and two smaller permits issued by the city building department raised to \$37,915.50 the total value of building operations for April and assured this month's being at least the second best April in seven years.

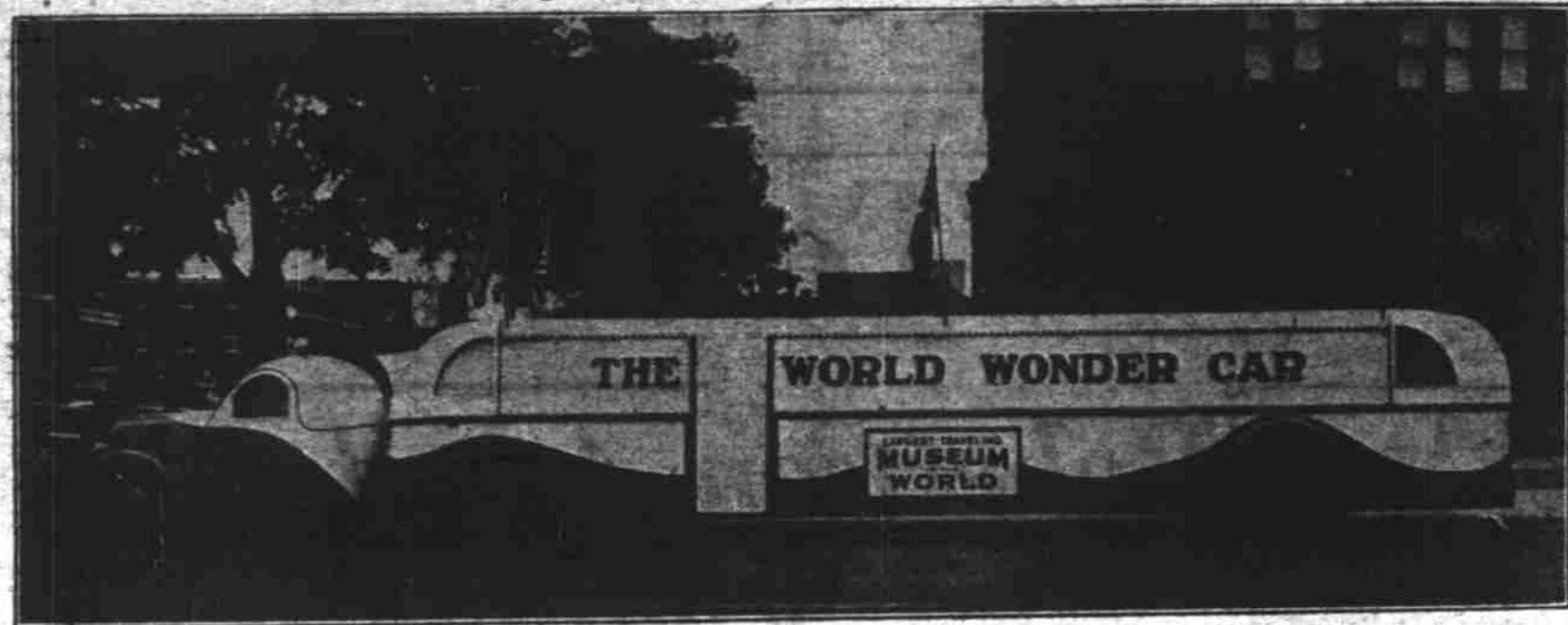
Permits yesterday went to F. D. Eason for a \$4015 house to be built at 735 South Church street, to R. S. White for a \$2500 frame store building to be erected by day labor at 1130 South Commercial, to A. J. Pitt for a \$1724 house which he will build at 1550 North Fourth, to Katherine Heckman for a \$1000 remodeling job at 2460 North Fourth and to O. L. Martin for \$25 worth of repairs at 423 North 10th street.

Forty new houses have been started here to date this year. Their total value as listed in permit records is \$83,843. Forty-nine houses valued at \$87,945 were built or started during all of 1935.

Governor Martin a fortnight ago adopted a policy of not replying to attacks on his administration made by Senator Burke. At the time he stated that the Yamhill county senator was only seeking to raise a controversy with the idea of making publicity for his campaign for state treasurer. A letter to the governor from Burke, criticizing the state capitol program, was not answered, the governor ordering only that it be filed.

Governor Martin pointed out yesterday that the capitol program was one adopted by the legislature, and that the capitol commission was in no sense an agency controlled by him.

A tax turnover of \$27,619.95 yesterday raised to approximately \$190,000 the city's cash funds and sent the general fund alone to the \$70,000 mark, Mundt said. The city's present favorable financial condition, he pointed out, is in sharp contrast to the situation less than three years ago, when more than \$200,000 in interest-bearing warrants were outstanding.

The city already has received 41 per cent of its 1936 tax levy. Of a total levy of \$353,387.04, the city has collected through the county treasurer \$141,639.58.

Mundt said the city could call in bonds for early redemption or buy its own bonds on the open market to effect interest savings. City funds lying idle in local banks are drawing only one-fourth of 1 per cent interest.

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Democrats Gain, Still Far Behind

Registered democrats in Marion county have increased 2207 in number since April, 1934, according to a summary compiled by the county clerk's office late yesterday. Republican registrations in the county, however, are almost twice as many as those of the democratic party, the total for the former being 20,653 this year which is exactly the same number of members of that party were registered before the primary election in May, 1934.

Democrats in the county who registered increased from 3763 two years ago to 10,970 this year. The total registration in all parties for the county shows an increase of 2187 in two years, the aggregate registration now amounting to 32,160.

Socialists lead all other minor parties in the county with a registration of 86, prohibitionists come next with 59 while miscellaneous, non-partisan registrants aggregate 380.

ding, who had shown indications of breaking under the strain of the long entombment was carried above ground.

Under the direction of Salvation army workers, the grim, weary miners, successful in their fight to save the two men from death, sang "Praise God From Whom All Blessing Flow."

The rescue came after the tunneling crew had been almost frustrated just short of their goal by cribwork which blocked the tunnel. Engineers stressed a belief that if they tried to tear down the structure, through which they could see Scadding and Robertson, another cave-in might occur.

Early tonight diggers began cross-cutting to get around the framework of steel and wood in order to penetrate to the chamber where the two men were trapped.

Finally they reached the pit. Dr. Robertson called up the communication line over which he had been talking to those above ground for several days. "We'll be up in a few minutes. The men are here."

Body of Man Who Died Brought Up

"Take it easy, boys," Scadding said, as the first members of the tunneling crew reached in.

Then began the crouching, crawling ascent to the surface, where the ambulances of a medical unit waited to care for the two who had been almost given up for lost during the long days and nights of digging, blasting and drilling.

Morrell triumphantly cut the telephone wire which ran from the ground to the pit through a hole made by a dynamite blast. The long tube also had been used to send down small quantities of food to Dr. Robertson and Scadding, until they became too weak to risk walking to it through the water of their hole.

The body of Magill was brought above ground after Robertson and Scadding had been cared for.

Dr. Ed Gallie, a lifelong friend of Dr. Robertson, said: "Now we'll be able to run him for a day or so and then he'll be running us again. It is marvelous. Why, the doctor walked out of the mine and into his own room and demanded a big meal of beefsteak."

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Slot Machines Will Be Destroyed; Order Filed

Judge L. H. McMahan yesterday ordered Walter Lamkin, deputy county clerk, to make arrangements with Ralph Moody, special prosecutor, for the destruction of 13 slot machines being held by Sheriff A. C. Burk as the result of gambling raids here. Moody held up the destruction of the machines pending trial of the owners or lessees of the machines. Since the latter have admitted their guilt and paid their fines in circuit court, Judge McMahan said there was no longer need to keep the devices.
