# Framework Is In Place Now

LEBANON, April 24 - Due to fair weather and good organization, rapid progress is being made on the Lebanon high school gymnasium under the supervision of Contractor Swain of Corvallis, All of the cleaning up has been completed and most all the framework is in place. Rubbish was found to be nearly two feet deep

over all the floor. Almst all of the under floor was found to be intact as were the walls and the basement which took considerable time in the first building, destroyed by fire. June 1 has been set for the completion of the second gym. Firtex will again be used for interior finish. At present about 25 men sare employed on the job. Many say this is the fastest job of rebuilding they have yet seen. Covered by Insurance

All of the rebuilding cost is being covered by insurance. Two new doors will be added, one at each end of the front hall way. It will be completed in time for the Strawberry fair and State Grange convention which is to be held here sometime in June. It will also be used for graduation

Curtains for the new gymnasium already have been ordered and will be exactly like the old. The athletic supply room will again be located there as will be the Future Farmers' workshop.


