## Hundreds Take Part in Event

### Stayton and Brooks Gain Division Crowns in Softball Finals

Hubbard, Gates and Macleay grade schools walked off with the honors in the Marion county grade school track and field meet held at Leslie junior high school yesterday. A large crowd attended, though a shower thinned it out just before noon. Hundreds of boys and girls participated.

Each of the three schools, winners in their own classifications, were awarded a pennant for their performance. Hubbard took the crown for class A schools, those of over 100 students. Gates won the B class, schools of over 50 pupils and Macleay took the pennant for schools with less than 50 pupils.

Gates grabbed grand honors by scoring first in ten of the 29 events. Gates also took three seconds and four thirds. Hubbard had seven firsts, one second and five thirds. Macleay had one first and two seconds.

In the county softball finals held in conjunction with the meet Stayton turned in a no-hit game to beat Mt. Angel 2 to 0 and win the A division crown. Brooks beat Liberty 12 to 4 for B honors. No C class game was played. Brooks and Stayton will play Wednesday for the county "unlimited" championship.

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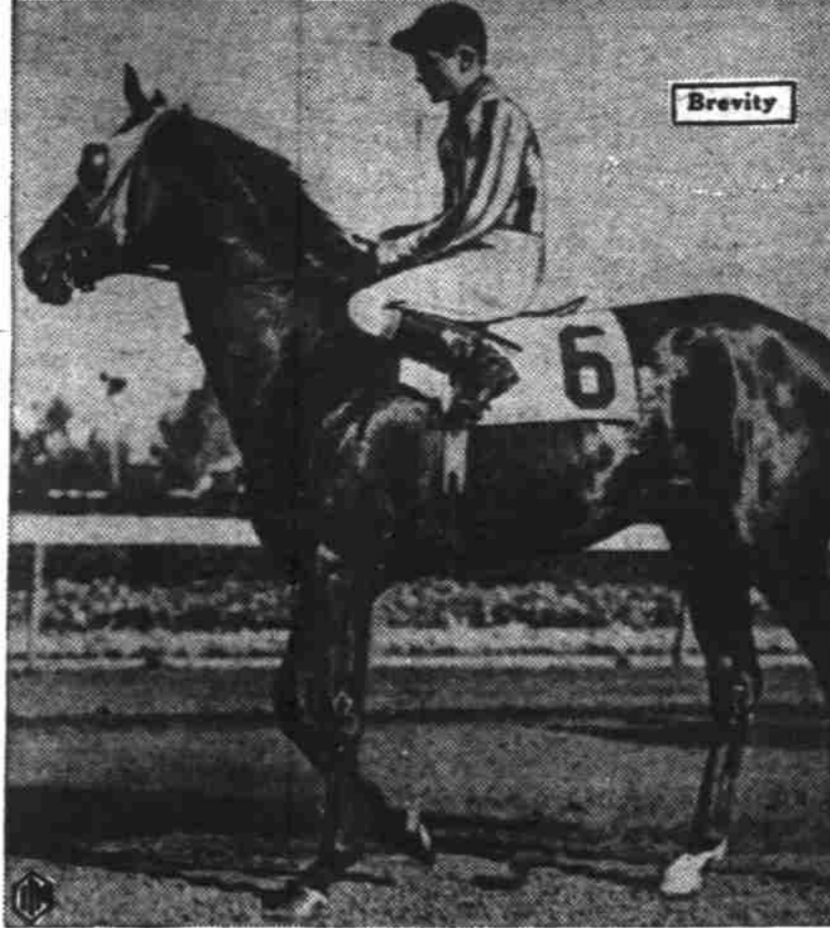
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## Brevity Favored in Turf Classic

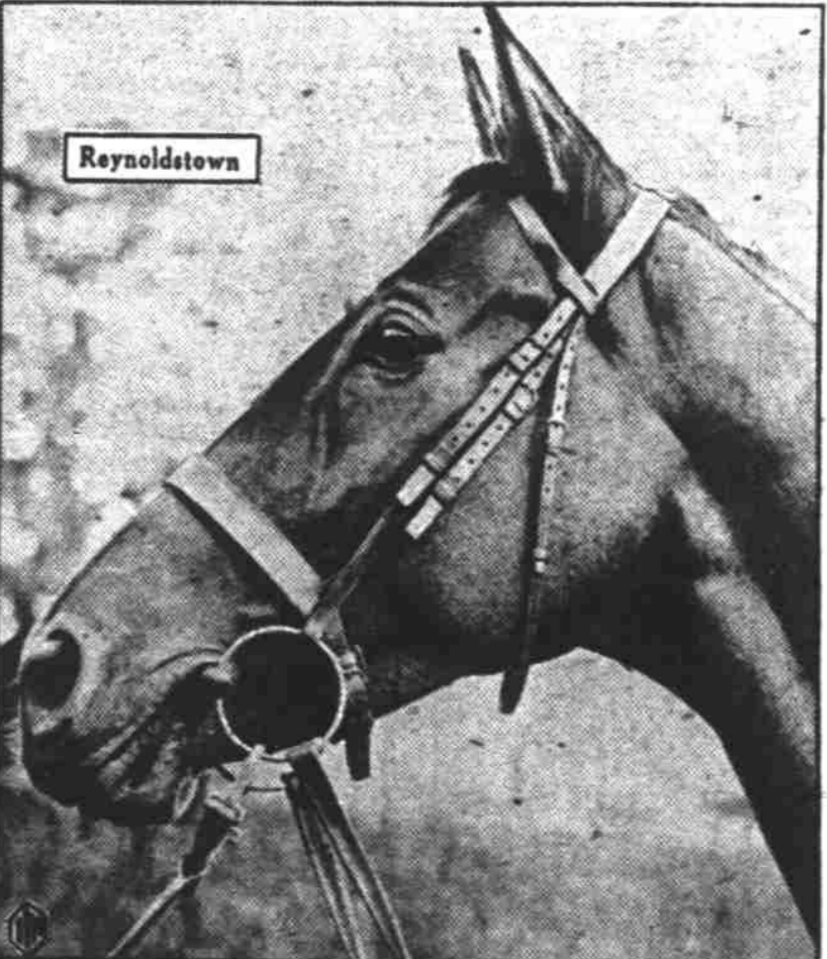
