

Loganberry Board District Elections Ordered by Officials

Meetings Will Be Held Soon

All Same Day, Probably on May 12; New Board to Meet Soon After

Meetings in the various districts for election of members to the new loganberry control board as soon as possible were ordered yesterday by the acting board of Oregon Loganberry Control Board, Inc., the new grower association for price regulation. H. G. Rumbaugh of Albany, president, presided at the board meeting yesterday.

These meetings, for which 10 days notice must be given, will probably be held May 12, at times and places designated yesterday. The directors, including six elected by co-op processors, will fix the minimum price of loganberries. They will be requested to meet the day following their election, although the minimum price may not be set at this time, and probably not until after a conference with canners.

Ludwig Has Oldest Nugget Mined in Oregon
GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 28.—(P)—Karl Ludwig came into possession of what he believes to be the oldest nugget, in its original form, mined in Oregon. The nugget was found by John and Jeff Howell at Althaus in 1855. It was kept in the Howell family until recently when the only member living sold it to Ludwig, superintendent of the state mining school here, so that its story would be perpetuated.

Morel is Rarity Since Columbia River High
HOOD RIVER, Ore., April 28.—(P)—Morel, which many consider a delicacy, has become a rarity during the freshest stage of the Columbia river. The fungus is found in the lowland flats in the leaf mold of willow trees.

Funeral Pyre of Ancient Oregonians Found
THE DALLES, Ore., April 28.—(P)—Exploration of a pile of leaf mold and debris near the John Day highway north of Fossil uncovered what archeologists here believe to be the funeral pyre of an ancient people. Charred bones were found in the smoldering mass at the bottom. Henry Simmons, Fossil editor, said similar findings have been reported in nearby areas.

Each of Salem Group Has Already Won Honors, Morgan Explains

Each of 14 Salem high school boys who will be permitted to attend the three-day state Future Farmers' convention starting on Thursday, has earned the privilege by winning local or district contests, R. L. Morgan, agricultural instructor, announced yesterday. Morgan predicted his students would provide stiff competition for other contestants in the statewide convention events.

Earl Noble of Salem, by having won the Willamette valley sectional public speaking contest, will speak at the convention.

Archie Gardner, one of Morgan's pupils, has met the study and project requirements which will entitle him to compete at Corvallis for the state farmer degree, the highest state Future Farmer award.

John Gardner, Robert Rulifson, Halbert Kemper, Jack Koch and Harry Robertson will represent the Salem Future Farmer chapter at an officers' training school to be conducted in conjunction with the convention.
