

Rufus Holman to Lay Lebanon Hospital Cornerstone Thursday

Lions Sponsor Event, Banquet

Historical Trowel Will Be Used; Weatherford to Be Speaker

LEBANON, April 28.—Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, will lay the cornerstone of the new Lebanon general hospital at ceremonies scheduled to take place Thursday, April 30, at 5:40 p. m. The local Lions club will be in charge of the event, with Dr. J. C. Booth, program chairman, making arrangements.

Holman will use an historical trowel, either one used in laying the Oregon state capitol cornerstone over 60 years ago, or the one used by President Theodore Roosevelt in laying the cornerstone of the postoffice in Portland over 30 years ago. Earl Perry, Portland, will donate the stone.

Mark V. Weatherford, Albany, will give an address at the Lions club banquet at Hotel Lebanon, immediately after the laying of the cornerstone. This will be "Ladies Night" at the Lions club.

Booth, president; Dr. Robert Miller, vice-president; Dr. N. E. Irvine, secretary-treasurer. Other members of the general medical staff sharing equally in the new building, will be Dr. Robert S. Note From Pitcairn Island Bears Signature That Recalls Days When Fletcher Christian Led Mutineers

SILVERTON, April 28.—Pitcairn Island has taken shape and the name of Christian, one of the Bounty mutineers, became real to at least one Silverton resident.

J. D. Drake, local philatelist, has received a personal note from the myrtle island, brought to life in recent years so picturesquely through the writings of Nordhoff and Hall. The note was signed by Miss Alta Christian, and it was remembered that Fletcher Christian was one of the Bounty mutineers.

The envelope was a part of the stamp collecting service that extends to practically every country of the world. However, as no steamships pull to port at Pitcairn Island because of the rough coast line, a note from there is not common. Just how it came about and how the personal note was added to the envelope is still a mystery to Mr. Drake. The envelopes are sent open, Mr. Drake explains.

The note was dated February 8 and the postal mark of Pitcairn Island, South Pacific ocean, was dated April 2, 1936. It is believed here that a ship had anchored some ways out in the ocean and the letters sent to shore by small boats. The ship has likely, it is thought, remained in its location until April.

The note, which bears no marks of punctuation but is capitalized, reads:

"Dear Friend:
"Just a week note to you from far away Pitcairn we make basket string beads paint leaves for sell on passing ships sometime we get a little from the passengers."
