Song Festival New This Year

Young Patsy Denmore Will Be Crowned as Queen; Sports Finale

SCIO, April 29.—Scio schools will play host Friday, May 1, to an all-day songfest and athletic meet. The song festival is an innovation of the annual May day program. Rural schools in the Scio area are expected to participate in the events.

Opening the program at 10 a. m. will be community and chorus singing of the national anthem, and "America" and salute to the flag. Mrs. Melvin Wilson of Scio will direct the lower division music, and Miss Marion White, also of Scio, the upper grades. Final rehearsals will be at 9 o'clock Friday morning.

First Grader Is Queen
Crowning of the May Queen, Patsy Denmore, Scio first grader, and winding of the May pole will be special features following the songfest of the grades.

The lower grades group will sing four numbers: "Marching Star," "Piggy Wig and Piggy Wee," "A Sea Song from the Sea," and "Yo San." Upper grades will sing in chorus "The Nightingale," "Music in the Air," "Which is the Way to Somewhere Town," and "Dabbling in the Dew."

Ball Game Is Finale
Athletic events are scheduled from 11 to 12 noon, and from 1 to 2:30 p. m. Three age limits, seven to nine, from 10 to 12, and from 13 to 15, will be entered in each of the five athletic events.

High school baseball games for both boys and girls with Harrisburg teams will conclude the fete. Principal J. H. Tumbleson of Scio high school is general chairman for the festivities. E. P. Caldwell, Scio grade principal, and Ralph McDonald of the Pleasant View school, are in charge of the athletics program. Eleanor Miller of the Arnold school is publicity chairman.
