The neophytes were afterward feted at a luncheon at the Hotel Argo.

Costs Assessed—Costs of \$87.90 have been assessed against the defendant in the case of John C. Dalk against Louis Lachmund and others. Dalk won a verdict in circuit court here which ordered defendants to pay him approximately \$1100 for prunes destroyed in a fire which razed defendants' drier. Dalk contended negligence by the defendants caused the loss of his prune crop.

WPA Planning For Future Activities

Prospect of Added Funds After July 1 Viewed at Portland Meet

PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—(AP)—The works progress administration in Oregon began the assembly of information today upon which it may proceed after July 1, 1936, when additional funds are expected.

E. J. Griffith, Oregon administrator, and his assistant, J. C. Albright, conferred with directors from the four Oregon areas and supervisors of operations on the availability of projects for work after July 1.

Albright said that no list of work has been prepared and that none will be drawn up until the question of funds is definitely settled. Congress must provide the money if the operations are to continue beyond June 30.

Albright said the discussion centered primarily upon what the Oregon administration would do if the program is extended by congress. He said it was decided to have directors and operations supervisors confer with county officials and others in their areas upon the question of what projects should be given preference in the event congress appropriates additional funds.

The deputy administrator pointed out that when the original list of Oregon projects was approved, it contained a large number which the administrators knew could not be completed or started this year but which they desired to have in reserve in the event of any emergency.

If the program is continued in 1936-37, the administration will determine later, through consultation with local officials, which projects should go forward first.

Honorary pallbearers will be A. D. Gardner, sr., Charles Fisher, F. F. Foster, Riley Thomas, George Spaniol and Frank Lesley, all of whom have been residents here for many years.

Active pallbearers will be Mayor George A. Smith, O. M. Baker, Grant Murphy and H. J. Rowe, councilmen; Charles Porter, city marshal, and Joseph Fisher, who represents the fire department. Business houses will close from 2 until 3 p. m.

Interment will be in the old Campbell cemetery, which is on a part of the old Grier farm, now owned by Gerard Toelle. Here Mr. Grier's parents were buried in 1877-78.

Surviving are two nieces, Mrs. W. H. Bordune, who has been keeping house for him here; Mrs. Ed Haynes, of Mill City and James Grier, a nephew, also of Stayton.

Valley Publicity Getting Results

ALBANY, Ore., April 30.—(AP)—C. H. Murphy, president of the Greater Willamette Valley association, said today newspaper advertising and pamphlets have interested hundreds of eastern farm families and that they have indicated they would move to western Oregon this spring and summer.

"We are inviting to Oregon only those who have money to invest and get a start," Murphy said. "Some settlers already have come. Hundreds of other families have indicated they are coming in May or June."

Murphy also commented "already much has been accomplished toward inter-community co-operation, one of the principal aims."

He said the second annual meeting would be held in May or June in Salem or Albany.

Insurance Firms' Action Deplored

Refusal to Write Public Indemnity Puts Trucks in Interstate List

The state utilities commission stands to lose a large amount of money annually in license fees as a result of the alleged refusal of certain old line insurance companies to write public indemnity and cargo insurance for certain classes of trucks operating over the Columbia river highway east of Portland.

This was announced yesterday by Frank C. McCulloch, state utility commissioner, who has launched an investigation.

Many of these trucks are now operating east from Portland by way of the Evergreen highway on the Washington side, McCulloch said.

McCulloch declared that a more serious aspect of the situation was

the removal of these trucks from state control. By crossing into Washington these trucks become interstate instead of intrastate, and control of their rates and operations, except for the exercise of police power, automatically switches to the newly created bureau of the interstate commerce commission for the regulation of truck and bus operations.

By reciprocal agreement trucks operating solely in Oregon and Washington are relieved of purchasing vehicle licenses in both states.

Under the Oregon law trucks shall carry public indemnity and property damage insurance in an amount to be determined by the state utilities commissioner.

McCulloch said he would attempt to find out why these trucks were being refused insurance by standard old line insurance companies.

Building Permits Hit \$50,000 Mark

Building permits passed the \$50,000 mark for April here yesterday afternoon approximate the total for April, 1935, and exceed by five times the record for April, 1934. Sixty-six permits valued at \$50,225.50 were issued last month, comparing favorably with 64 permits and \$51,877 a year ago and 41 permits and \$9877 in 1934.

Two residence jobs pushed the month's building figures above \$50,000. T. C. Crabtree took out a permit for a \$3100 house to be built at 575 D street by Chester Lee while Edward Rostein obtained permission to remodel a house at 1940 Royal at cost of \$1500. April permits included 23 for \$38,695 worth of new construction and 43 for \$11,533.50 in repairs and alterations. Eleven permits for new houses estimated

to cost a total of \$34,690 were included in the new construction amount.

New house construction here to date this year has amounted to \$92,088 in building permit records.

Payments on Job Insurance Slated

Notices were mailed yesterday to 5000 employers in Oregon informing them that payments of unemployment insurance taxes for the first four months of 1936 were due on or before May 20. Payments will be at the rate of nine-tenths of one per cent for the aggregate payroll for the four months.

Salaries paid executive officers will be included in the rolls on which the tax shall be paid. After May the payments are to be made each month. January, 1937, a tax of one per cent on all industrial payrolls for 1936 will be due to the federal government for the year 1936 but credit can be taken for the payments made to the state.
