(Continued from Page 1) year in reduced payrolls, or a total economy of \$30,000, Van Patten estimates. Could Sell Water

To Large Industries

The manager's report in addition pointed out that "with the proposed gravity source of supply, with natural filtration at Stayton island, it would be pocsible for the water commission to sell filtered water to large industries such as the paper mill and to state institutions, both in and out of the city, at a price which they could afford to pay, and this increase in revenue could be secured without any increase in production costs."

A minimum of five million gallons of water daily would safely be available for such sale should the gravity line delivering 16 million gallons each day be built, it is estimated. Initial Cost Less Than Million, Held

Van Patten predicted that the water system development program, aside from laying of new mains within the city, would cost less than \$1,000,000.

"It is believed that the development of the natural infiltration system on Stayton island will cost approximately \$50,000 less than the erection of the filtration plant estimated by the engineers and that all bids received in the future on labor and material . . . will be considerably less than the estimates as has been the case on bids receiv- Dave Shepard Is ed to date," Van Patten wrote. "It is altogether probable that the total cost of all work originally estimated to cost \$1.150 .-000 will be well under \$1,000. 000 if the natural infiltration system is developed on Stayton island."

The quality of the island water, the manager points out, has been pronounced "class A" by the state board of health. "It is our intention to com-

pletely fence that portion of Stayton island which would be purchased by the city, thereby afport adds.






